In reference thereto, the Commissioners state that the objection which in general, apply to the employment of pauper labour on the streets of private persons, appear to apply, in a certain degree to the present proposition; and the Commissioners say they must decline to sanction the labour of Paupers being given in aid of the Rates, which should be made for cleansing the Town of Weymouth.

The Clerk was desired to state to the Commissioners, that it was not exclusively the able-bodied Paupers that the Guardians propose to put to sweep the streets of Weymouth, but the Boys, generally, for whom employment could not at all times be found.

A Letter from the Commissioners, dated the 24th March 1840, No. 1344, stating that they had received a Communication from Mr. John Mc Carlland complaining that he had been removed from the office of Assistant Master of the Workhouse, and that another person had been appointed in his place, on charge of neglect of duty having been proved against him.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directed to be carried into effect:-

A letter from the Commissioners, dated the 26th May 1840, No. 438-Me. 40, transmitting in duplicate a form for a Return of the progress of the collection of the Poor Rate, which is to be filled up for the Month of May, in continuation of the return furnished down to the end of April 1840.

The Commissioners also request to be furnished with an account of the liabilities of the Union on the 31st May, & of the current expenses of the Month of May, in a duplicate form now received, to be sent them by the 11th June 1840.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners, and others were read by the Clerk, and directed to be answered respectively, to the following effect (see Orders under no. 439, respectively as follows):-

A Circular from the Commissioners, dated 22nd May 1840, No. 20-074, addressed to the Clerks of the 25th Division, in which they suggested that lists of persons receiving Relief should be printed and posted, & should be affixed to Public Stations as well as to other places, but the Commissioners having been informed that objection exists to the lists being posted up Public Houses, they request that the notices may be discontinued, & that the lists be posted elsewhere.

A Circular from the Commissioners, dated the 23rd May 1840, states that they have been informed that the families of persons occupying more than one quarter of an acre of land, suffer in some cases very great privation in consequence of the loss of the family refusing to give up the cultivation of any part of their land, and being therefore not entitled to receive relief under the provisions of 11 Geo. 4, c. 31, Sec. 1.

The Commissioners have had legal advice on this subject, and they state that each member of a family of persons who occupy more than one quarter of an acre of land may be entitled to legally be relieved in the Workhouse, or if the Workhouse be full, the Guardians may relieve them out of the Workhouse, if an Order of the Commissioners, for that purpose under the sanction of the

let be in operation in the Union in which they reside.

It is not to be understood from the above observations that a person occupying more than a quarter of an acre of land is himself relievable either in or out of the Workhouse.

A Circular from the Commissioners, dated the 10th May 1840, No. 400-Me. 40, addressed to their Clerks of the 19th Division, on the supply of serum for the vaccination of inmates of Workhouses; the Commissioners state, that the directors of the New South Institution have expressed their desire to be furnished with an annual report of the number vaccinated in each Workhouse, the period adopted for the inspection of the several cases, or, as the Medical Officers of the Workhouses may be able to communicate.

The Commissioners request that the Medical Officer of the Workhouse may be supplied with a Book, in a form similar to one now received, in which the requisite particulars may be recorded, and the Medical Officer is to sign the names every case of vaccination by him in the Workhouse, in any Union where the Guardians subscribe for vaccine virus to the New South Institution.

The Commissioners also request that a return containing a summary of the cases registered, be annually sent them immediately after the 25th March.

A circular from the Commissioners, dated the 16th June 1848, at No. 466. With Returns for a Statement of the expenses incurred by the General Division of the Union in maintaining the Poor from the 25th September 1847, to the 25th March 1848, showing the amount for Board of each expense, also a statement of the estimated expenses, which will be incurred by the General Division of the Union in maintaining the Poor from the 25th March 1848, to the 25th September 1849, which will remain to the credit of the Division out of the Poor Rates, after deducting the estimated expense to the 25th September 1848.

A letter was read from Mr. Singleton Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners, signed and appointed to inquire into the Proceedings of the District Division of the Poor Law Commission in Ireland, printed in 20 copies of which is proposed with reference to the enquiry submitted to them, & requesting to have the distribution amongst the Guardians of the Union.

An enclosed form is to be filled up, after the distribution of the queries is completed & returned to the District Pauper Commission Office.

A letter from the Commissioners, dated the 23rd June instant, concerning the payment to District Board of the sum of £3.12.8 for discharge of the duties described in the following Resolution.

A letter from the Commissioners, dated the 23rd June 1848, at No. 34008, 401, directing that the Commissioners may be informed whether any steps have been taken with regard to the eight poor persons referred to in the communication from Mr. Green of 13th of 1847, who had attended at the Workhouse but were not admitted.

The Clerk was directed to inform the Commissioners that he had written to Mr. Green expressing the regret of the Guardians that these people did not return from the Medical Officers, & stating to him, Mr. Green, that should they come again, that every attention would be paid them.

In the above letter of the 23rd June 1848, at No. 34008, 402, in regard to the appointment of Mr. Ryan a valuator of the Union, the Commissioners desire to be informed by the Board whether the appointment of the Union commenced by Mr. Ryan, would if completed, be similar to that made by the Board here, or whether the total amount of the Unionland valuation is proposed to be spread over the great number of parishes liable to poor rate, in which event the Poor Law valuation would, in many cases, be lower than that for basins kept. The Commissioners also request to be informed whether any improvements proposed to be made in carrying this appointment.

The Clerk is directed to state for the information of the Commissioners, that the Ryan present valuation has no reference to the present valuation, it is in fact a new valuation, to which the Commissioners have already expressed their disapproval.

Upon consideration of further employ-
ment of Dauphin in the Washburne, we find
that such is particularly requested amongst
the women, and that little improvement
can be made until further accommodation
is provided.

There are at present 150 able-bodied women in the Workhouse, and but one day's work for month.

It is manifest that both for the employment of the paupers and their health additional accommodation is necessary.

It is recommended that for the sake of economy and despatch, this be provided by the erection of buildings, attached to the present, and that in order to burden the poor payers as little as possible, the Commission-ers be applied to, to sell the old Workhouse, and the premises attached to it, which by the 34th Sec. of the Irish Poor Relief Act are vested in them, and to apply the proceeds to the erection of such buildings as may be required.

1 We find also that additional accom-
modation is required on the New side, but
not to the same extent as on the other. The
want of room is only felt at present in
wet weather, when all the able bodied
Boys are crowded into one day Room.
To obviate this we recommend that addi-
tion be erected on the New side in which the
Boys can be set to work in bad weather.
It must be a far superior site, the House shall
be made to serve one itself. That the House
used in the House be raised by the Boys,
and the bread baked that a great num-
ber of trades be taught to the Boys, and that
additional room be provided to admit a
larger number to be taught each trade.

The Commissioners request that steps will be taken to put the Rates in collection as speedily as possible.

And that Mr. Kline be requested to convey these our opinions to him; on the meantime we avail ourselves of his office as resident at the General Hospital, & the Board of Guardians will be most happy to receive suggestions from him at all times. Copied unanimously.

A letter from the Commissioners, dated the 20th September 1840, &c. 31256, &c. 40, calling the Board's attention to the rate per cent premium of insurance paid on the main Building of the Workhouse, and also stating that the usual rate per cent in most cases on the portion of the Workhouse Building is 1.6, & as the Board have caused that sum the Commissioners request to be informed of the cause of this difference.

A Circular from the Commissioners, dated the 20th September 1840, &c. 52, 367, &c. 40, calling the attention of the Guardians to the provisions of the 4th Section of the temporary Poor Law Act (12 Geo. 4. c. 131) under which the Central Board of Health may, with the approval of His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, require the Guardians to appoint Medical Officers for the purpose of that Act, & to fix their salaries, subject to the approval of the Board of Health of the persons so appointed, & of the salaries to be fixed. And where the Medical Officer is appointed by a requisition of the Board of Health, the appointment and salary of such Officer should be reported to the Board of Health by the Clerk of the Union.

Expressed by Mr. Brown, seconded by Captain Hanley, that the Board write to the Board of Health that the two Medical Officers, Doctors Lane & Goodell, who were hitherto in charge of the General Hospital are again appointed, at a salary of 50 guineas each per year.

The following letters from the Poor Law Commissioners, and others were read by the Clerk, and discussed in private session, as follows:-

A circular from the Commissioners, dated the 11th December 1840, No. 936-1840, in which they request that an accompanying form, enclosing the names of inmates including idiots & epileptics in the Workhouse of each Union, on the 31st December instant, may be sent up, certified by the Medical Officer, & transmitted to this office without delay.

A letter from the Commissioners acknowledging the receipt of answers to queries respecting the appointment of Catherine Thompson as Deputy Matron of Females in the auxiliary Workhouse here, & in reference thereto, the Commissioners state that they will defer giving their sanction to the Matron's appointment until satisfactory evidence shall be given of her competency to perform the duties of her office.

A letter from the Commissioners, dated the 21st December 1840, No. 67277, in reference to a Minute of the Board on the 9th instant, directing that the sum of £33-11-3 be struck off the Electoral Division of the Collection District of Catholic Hayes, for which sum Christopher Rogers & Co. are accountable. And the Commissioners request that they may be furnished with an explanation of the particulars of this direction, & may be also informed

as to the state of the proceedings against Rogers & his sureties.

And in reference to a Minute of the Board on the same day, the 9th instant, with reference to the sum of £33-11-3, ordered to be struck off the Electoral Division as Rate uncollectable, and houses unoccupied in said Division; and requesting that the particulars of the account may be given, & whether the sums to be struck off were examined by a Committee of Guardians.

In answer to the Commissioners' letter of the 21st December 1840, No. 67277, 1840, on the subject of the Rate struck off the Division in the Collection District of Catholic Hayes, the Clerk is directed to state to the Commissioners that a Bond from Christopher Rogers & his sureties for £33-11-3 is in the hands of Mr. Ryan, the District Solicitor, & that he communicate with Mr. Ryan on the state of the proceedings in the case, & inform the Commissioners of his answer.

Resolved unanimously, that in consequence of the letter of the Commissioners, No. 67277, requesting an explanation as to the large amount of arrears of rates which the Guardians consider ought to be struck off as not recoverable in the Division of Catholic Hayes, the Board having this day carefully examined the subject, find that the said arrears are not recoverable, and consist almost wholly of unoccupied houses & houses in ruins.
