They reported that the Medical Officer stated that it is absolutely necessary that the cells should remain in the Female Lunatic Ward to isolate patients under restraint when occasion should arise. He therefore disagreed with the recommendation of the Committee to break up the several cells making them into one large airy ward.

the minutes. The following discrepancies ^{seem} apparent.

1. With regard to the Female Lunatic Apartment Mr Hamilton repeated the opinion expressed by him in his last preceding Report, to the effect that that department "cannot be made better without being altogether remodelled" instead of "Could be made much better &c" as recorded on the Minutes.

2. In regard to Cleanliness Mr Hamilton observed the Infirmary is particularly well kept, so are the aged women's wards, the girls and infants schools and indeed I may add the Boys School. Aged men's wards much improved.

It will thus be seen that it was merely the aged men's wards that the Inspector referred to as much improved, whereas the entry on the Minutes included the aged women's wards and the several schools in that description. Mr Hamilton has requested the Local Government Board to inform the Guardians of these discrepancies.

The Clerk produced the letter referred to No 26508. 21st Oct. '81. and this letter proved the Clerk's entry referred to (No 1. above) is literally correct. Regarding No 2. it was shown from the extract as given in the above mentioned letter No 26508, that the Clerk's reading of it was at least the natural one.

Gentlemen.— I find it absolutely necessary to call your attention to the irregular manner in which things are being carried on in this house on Sunday mornings and the unnecessary inconveniences arising therefrom. 



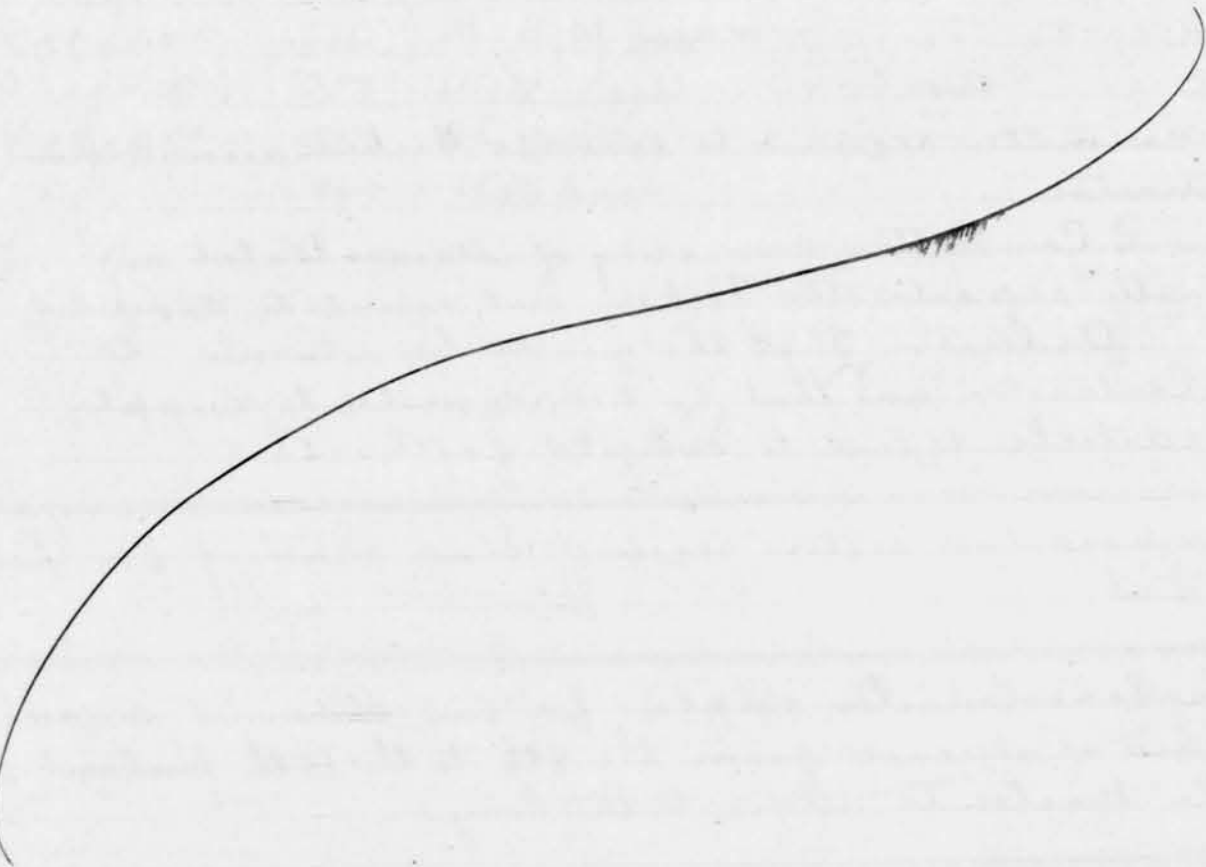
