The Schoolmaster asked that his son, a boy of 12 years of age—might be allowed to stop with him in his own room at night, as he was anxious to send him to school in Wexford.

No 38533. 5 January 1883. Stating that they had received the Half-yearly Report on the Union, from their Inspector — Mr Hamilton, and that it is of a favourable character generally as regards the management of the Workhouse and the conduct of the Officers.

He states that the financial condition of the Union is not satisfactory owing to the cause pursued by the Guardians in reducing the Clerk's Estimate from £10,069 to £8,254:9:7, and that the rate will in all probability be inadequate to provide for the requirements of the Union till the 29th September next, but that the Guardians have given an undertaking to make further rates, if necessary.

He states that in many parts of the Workhouse the wards are as full as is desirable and there is no available room in the able-bodied men's or aged men's departments, and that the sleeping accommodation for able bodied men is full.

The Arrangements for the Industrial training of the children are sufficient.

Measles have been prevalent, and a few cases of Scarlatina from Wexford town have been admitted to the Hospital, but all the cases were either convalescent or going on well on the occasion of his visit.

The Lunatics and Idiots are treated with proper care great improvement having been effected in the Female Lunatic ~~Department~~ Accommodation. Some of the Infirmary Floors are much worn in the gangways.

The Local Government Board request that the Guardians will be good enough to take the various matters adverted to in Mr Hamilton's Report into their favourable consideration.

A Committee consisting of Messrs Peacocke J.P., Redmond, Ryan, and Cassin, were appointed to consider



the different sections of Mr Hamilton's Report regarding the Workhouse, and the following resolution regarding his allusion to the Financial Condition of the Union was proposed by Mr Keavoche, ~~and~~ seconded by Mr Pettit and passed unanimously.

That we hope the Local Government Board will not consider the "Financial Condition of our Union is unsatisfactory". That we have at all times been desirous to strike a sufficient rate and we believe the rate for this year will not prove an exception. as we are quite satisfied that with strict economy it will carry us through.
