Dr Pierse's letter states that scarlatina was rather prevalent in his District and believed that the disease was spread by the following means: (1) Neglect of parents in reporting cases, the disease being of a very mild type, and their objection to have their children removed to the Fever Hospital. (2) Sending children to school before their recovery. (3) Refusing to have children removed to the Fever Hospital as they become ill. The Doctor also states that he was obliged to threaten the enforcement of the 141 sec of the Public Health Act; that he believed the lower classes looked on it as a necessity to have scarlatina, Measles, and Whooping cough and took no precaution to avoid the contagion, and that "Simple Continued Fever" and "Diseases of the Respiratory System" are very prevalent.

No 21684. 22nd June '83. Stating that they had received the half-yearly report of Mr Hamilton on the Union in which he states that the condition of the Workhouse and the discharge of their duties by the several officers is of a generally satisfactory character.

He further states that every class of inmates appeared to be well cared for and that he found all the departments in their usual good order some of them—for instance the ~~Girls~~ Infirmary, the Girls and Infants' schools respectively and the aged women's ward—being very creditable.

He further reports that the present financial condition of the Union is satisfactory but that the Union will probably be nearly £1000 in debt at the close of the half-year.

Mr Hamilton further states that many parts of the Establishment are still quite as full as is desirable.

The following extracts from his report are deserving the consideration of the Guardians:—

Cleanliness:—Duly observed in every Department; the Infirmary, the Girls' school, and the aged women's ward, are not second to any in my district.

Nursery Ward.—This ward intended to facilitate the separation of married and unmarried mothers has been used for the industrial training of a few boys in straw covers.

Sanitary Condition of Workhouse:—Satisfactory. In my last report I referred to the rate of mortality in the Workhouse for the 4 years ending 29th September 1882. In the half-year ending 25th March '83 there were 86 deaths, and since the 25 of March there have been 33. Such a large number of deaths—most of them ~~less~~ shortly after admission—is, I think, prima facie evidence of the necessity for every possible effort being made by the Sanitary Authority, especially of the Urban District to trace the causes of any undue or excessive death rate and deal effectually with them.

Children at nurse:—The Relieving officers visit the children at nurse every month: their reports are satisfactory and are entered in a book, but sometimes at longer intervals than a month.

Sanitary Condition of the Union:—I have no very recent returns as to the Wexford Dispensary District, but in the Quarter ended 31st March last the mortality was exactly in excess of the rate in the corresponding Quarters of the three previous years—being 142 as against 114. Of these deaths, 19 were children under one year of age, and only 56 were persons aged 60 years and upwards. I cannot help fearing that the graveyards in the town of Wexford affect, more or less, its sanitary condition. I am aware that since the appointment of a caretaker there has been marked improvement in some respects, but all experience proves that there is danger from interring the dead amidst the habitations of a town population. In the urban Sanitary District of Wexford the annual death rate per 1000 was 35.5 in the quarter referred to, being 12.1 over the death-rate of all Ireland.
