Our late milk contractors discontinued the supply of milk to the Workhouse on Sunday morning last without giving any notice whatever, so that the inmates were left without even milk for their tea on that day. I hired a car on same day, went to different parts of the Country, and succeeded in getting 40 gallons daily. On following day not having sufficient supply, I was obliged to take 20 gallons daily from Mr. P. Maddock at price refused by him on last Board Day. Substitutes for Milk on Sunday and Monday entered in Provision Cheek Account.

Medical Officer's Report:— I received a verbal message from Mrs Erwin on Sunday night at 9.10 o'clock to visit a patient named Laurence Kelly who was admitted on that day. I found him in a dying state and gave directions to have the Chaplain sent for. He died about 10 o'clock A.M. on Monday.

An Inmate named Charlotte Shelly aged 36, of the healthy department of the Workhouse took suddenly ill in the kitchen at 11 o'clock A.M. on the 25th and continued in a bad state until she died at 10 o'clock A.M. on the 26th. I sent for the Chaplain and Medical Officer both attended her about noon on the 25th and again on the 26th. I reported the death to the Constabulary. An Inquest was held on the 24th.

Medical Officer's report on this case:— On Christmas day I received an Order from the Master at about 11.30' O'clock to attend Charlotte Shelly. I saw her at about 12.15' O'clock P.M. and found her in a state of collapse. I prescribed and gave instructions to the sisters as to treatment. I saw her again at 8 o'clock the next morning when I found her in a dying state. She died about 10 o'clock. I have heard that an Inquest was held.

The Clerk read a copy of the verdict of the jury which stated that she died from "Natural Causes" and added that "All the Officers did their duty towards deceased"

A Protestant patient in hospital named Eliza Pickering, aged about 70 years, sent for me on the 26th inst., and told me that she wanted to have her religion changed. Thinking she was near dying I had brought into her presence two men—Catholic & Protestant—and again before them she repeated her request and further added to my query "Has any person interfered or tampered with you?" That "no person had in any way, but that she had been thinking of it for some time. I then wrote to the Roman Catholic Chaplain and stated to him the circumstances.

The following Committee were appointed to visit the woman:— Messrs Peacocke J.P., Rowe & Ryan. They reported that she has changed her faith from conscientious motives and recommended that she be entered on the Register as a Roman Catholic.
Ordered— That the Report be adopted

No 45, 245. 28 Dec. 83. Stating that they had received the Half-yearly Report of their Inspector Mr Hamilton, which is of a generally satisfactory character as regards the condition of the Workhouse and the discharge of their duties by the several Officers; and Mr Hamilton repeats the favorable opinion he expressed in his last Half-yearly Report as to the state of the Workhouse. As regards the financial Condition of the Union he states that the Guardians will soon be out of debt, but that a sum of £113:10:11, seed loan, still remains due to the Commissioners of Public Works, which, if paid, would close the account, and adds that a sum of £111 of Seed Rates still remains uncollected. As regards the adequacy of the Workhouse to the wants of the Union Mr Hamilton states that there is not as much spare accommodation as is desirable; but there is no overcrowding at present, but that there is no great margin in either the Infirmary or

Wards for aged & infirm. He also states that the Infirmary Yards are very confined and are quite too limited for the number of sick, but that they are duly attended to.

The Local Government Board forward some extracts from Mr Hamilton's Report which are deserving of the Guardians consideration: Extracts from Mr Hamilton's last Half-yearly Report respecting the Sanitary Condition of the Workhouse and the Union generally were sent to the Guardians with the Board's Letter of the 22nd June last

Extracts from Mr Hamilton's Report:—

The Schools are well managed and the progress of the children is satisfactory; reports very satisfactory; examined for results in September, '83. Two or three of the boys at trades do not attend school regularly, neither do the Baker boys. Article 23 of the Workhouse Rules do not admit of any exception in this respect.

The Sanitary Condition of the Workhouse is satisfactory, but the observations in my last Half-Yearly Report, are still, I think, applicable. The large number of serious cases under treatment in the Infirmary—admitted simply for Medical Relief—are, I think prima facie evidence of need for the utmost vigilance as regards the sanitary condition of the town of Wexford in particular.

The Lunatics and Idiots are treated with proper care; the accommodation for these classes has been greatly improved and is now above the average; the cells to which I recently objected have been altered; one of them has been added to the Infirmary Kitchen which is now a suitable one.

I think too that my observations as to the death-rate of Wexford are still generally applicable, but, as I am not furnished with the most recent returns and have failed to procure them, I can only express my belief that as regards epidemics and a high death rate, Wexford does not compare favorably with towns of the same population. I have read the extracts from the last Report alluded to and it was ordered—That

it be suggested to the Local Government Board that a copy of that part of the Report relating to the Sanitary condition of the Urban District should be sent to the Corporation of Wexford. It was also ordered that Article 23 of the Workhouse Rules be strictly carried out as regards the boys at trades.

The Grate is in pieces; the flue is so imperfect, and in such bad condition that when the fire is lighted it causes smoke through the Wards. I need scarcely add that I consider this very injurious to the patients. A new grate is also required in male ward. I trust the Board will kindly have this remedied as soon as possible.
