Dr Pierse wrote relating to Letter No. 8,475 dated 16th May 1884., and stated that he visited Catherine Doyle on the 9th February and found her suffering from Chronce Bronchitis. I expressed an opinion that she would not necover and that it would not be proper to remove her. She was in a very miserable condition, and the husbands having stated that he could not attend to her wants, as he was obliged to attend to his own work (that of a fisherman) the Doctor considered it better to have her removed and wrote a certificate to that effect.
