I brought the fat pigs to the fair on Monday last but could not get a sufficient price for them, and I brought them home again. They are to be sold by tender to day and should get at least \$ 21. Having plenty of pig food at present time I bought six stores, we have now eighteen. The Clerk stated that not having sold the pigs - and it being of importance that a fresh supply should be bought at the fair - he had asked the Treasurer to advance £ 12 until to-day. The Treasurer did so and he (the Clerk) now presented a Cheque for that amount for the Guardians Signature - draw as usual in favour of the Master Ordered - Approved.

By Mr. Colfers directions I left Workhouse on Friday morning in order to attend sessions at New Ross in the case of George murphy V The Guardians. If not home in time of Board Meeting I will telegraph about George. (murphy's case is as follows: - He had frequently neglected to support his wefo and famely, who were obliged to come into the Workhouse; for this offence he was twice prosecuted and impresoned.
