The Clerk's estimate of rate was then considered.

The Guardians for Wexford Electoral Division pointed out that their rate was very high, that they had an exceptionally high rate, their sanitary rate alone being $3\frac{3}{4}$ in the £; that they would use every economy during the year, and that if the rates would not be sufficient, they would not object to a sufficiently high rate next year, when the sanitary rate in the town would be only 1 shilling in the £.




