The master made the following report verbally:—"On the night of Wednesday the 14th Inst. at 9.10 o'clock a man named Thomas Walsh appeared for admission to the Workhouse, bringing with him a certificate from Dr. Ciersle, stating that he was a fit case for the Infirmary. Having got the necessary information from him as to his age, chargeability, &c, I asked him what was his complaint and he mentioned a loathsome disease. I told him it was a shame for a married man like him and I directed that he should be placed in the probationary ward of the Workhouse until the medical officer saw him next morning. He appeared like a man who was recovering from being drunk. At between nine and ten o'clock next morning I was informed by an inmate (the Porter's assistant) that the man Walsh had left at 6.30 that morning carrying his shoes in his hands; he also said that he was a "queer fellow". I remarked "I suppose he is gone home" and gave the matter no further thought until Friday when I was informed by his brother-in-law that he had not gone home. I then directed the brother-in-law to inform the Constabulary and I believe he did so. No trace was heard of the man until the 22nd Inst, when his body was found in the River Slaney". An Inquest was held on the 23rd Inst. The following was the verdict of the Jury:—"we find that Thomas Walsh was admitted to the probationary ward of the Workhouse on the 14th Inst. August; we find that he was found dead in the River Slaney at Workford on the 22nd August; that death resulted from drowning; and that we have no evidence as to how deceased got into the water. We find also that the deceased was admitted into Workford Workhouse on the 14th August and ran out of it on the 15th; and that no blame can be attached to the Workhouse officials. We find that ~~deceased~~^{deceased} was insane at the time of his death. We quite agree with the verdict of the Jury.
