"Resolved - That this Board takes this opportunity of expressing its appreciation of the latest move of the hereditary enemies of our country, by which all their past efforts - aided and abetted as they were by the Government - having failed ignominiously, they now seek to effect the ruin of the Irish Cause by a second attempt upon the honour of its chosen leader - Mr Tarnell. We believe that this last and basest effort will be like the past ones, failed, and we tender to Mr Tarnell the expression of our unabated confidence, and our hope and prayer that he will emerge from the attack unscathed and triumphant over the machinations of the most unscrupulous enemies that ever sought the ruin of a great cause by the cowardly destruction of its leader."

The milk has been delivered very irregularly during the week, varying from 8 to 9 o'c A.M. and from 5 to 6 o'c P.M.

'Tis hard for contractors to be up to a mark — there are many changes of servants and other matters to be contended with on a farm. Although I write this I am no great friend of our contractors but I can hear and see their difficulties.

It was different in the morning. I had Mary Scallan, Rosslare and W^m Rossiter, Ardavan, sent to the Ennisorthy Asylum on 13th and 14th Inst. We had great difficulty in removing them — Rossiter broke the Car windows and it took three men to keep him quiet until they arrived at the Asylum. I wish the Guardians would give me some particular order about the admission of such persons — we have a very poor staff to look after them here, and generally find their transfer to the Asylum very troublesome. The Relatives of these Lunatics give no assistance at removal.







- 4 "No sanction has been produced to me for the payment of £1-15-0 to the Relieving Officers for services in connection with the Vaccination Acts. I shall be compelled to disallow this amount at my next audit of the Union accounts, should the requisite sanction be not forthcoming.
 - 5 "Some of the masters Books are carelessly kept and I have cautioned him to be more particular in the way he discharges his duties in future"
 - 6 "The Rural Collectors were given their warrants on the 6th October '88; they are bound by their warrants to close their collection within 8 months, but, as a matter of fact, their collections were not closed till August & September and even then rates to the amount of £339 remained outstanding. The Collection at present is not in a forward state and the Collectors should be directed to use greater energy in getting in the rates"
 - 7 "Stock of provisions & clothing was not taken at the close of last half year".
- Ordered:— That Mr Colfer's (Solicitor) attention be called to paragraphs 1 & 2. In reference to 2 the Clerk of the Union stated he was not aware he had Col. Sheppard's conveyance until he accidentally happened on a letter from Mr Colfer; his assistant had charge of these documents and he was from home during part of the audit. He now produced the two conveyances and laid them before the Board. No 3.
