Medical Officer's Report. — I beg to inform the Board that a man named John Seary, a native of Kilmore, has been admitted into Hospital on an order from Dr. Hasselt for the purpose of having him sent to the Ophthalmic Hospital. One of his eyes has been completely dark for ten years; the other has been nearly so from cataract for two years, being just able to discern the light. An operation may be of service to the latter eye.

I hope the Board will kindly grant permission to Eliza McElrath, on whom an operation was kindly performed in March last to revisit St. Marks Hospital whenever Dr. Story will send word for her to go.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2634 to No. 2640 both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and counter-signature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined and authenticated, from No. — to No. —, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and counter-signature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:—

That he had complied with the orders given him by the previous Board.

The Auditors attended here on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday and audited the accounts of the Union for half-year ended 25 March 1890. He left the following remarks on the ledger:—The following tenants of Labourers Cottages in Mr. Murphy's District are in arrear with their rents to 5th April last: M. Brien and R. Gurlong. M. Moran is in arrear up to 19th April. R. Connick owes 33/- to 25 March 1890, which he has not yet paid off. In Mr. Wilson's District I find the rents are badly paid up in several instances. W. Leary owes 19/- to 25 March, J. Holmes owed 30/- on the 28 August; J. Leary owed 4/- to 31st July; J. Whitty, 28/- to 31 July.

I also find that the following tenants though heavily in arrear were not reported by Mr. Wilson when his last report was sent in: Jas. Murphy, Jas. Sutton, Jas. Neill, R. Cullen, John Byrne, John Cullen, M. Scully, John Hayes and Jas. Larkin.

From a close examination of Mr. Wilson's books, I have come to the conclusion that he is not capable of satisfactorily discharging the duties of Relieving Officer and Rent Collector, and I am satisfied that in the interests of the Union, a change is necessary.

In future I have directed the Collectors to report to the Board of Guardians every month as to the state of their rent collections; any tenant owing three months rent should be proceeded against. I have directed the Clerk of the Union to include a column in the Collectors' monthly report sheets for the Chairman's initials authorizing the Collectors to proceed to recover the rent due, and a second column for the Chairman's initials when the Collector is not to proceed. Should the Union be at any loss in consequence of the Board of Guardians declining to authorize proceedings being taken, I shall be compelled to hold the Chairman responsible.

I consider it very desirable and necessary that the tenants should send in their last books at least once in each half-year, for the purpose of comparison with the rent books kept by the Clerk of the Union. The Book of Bond drawn up by the L.F. Board should be at once signed by the Rent Collectors & their sureties.

The Indoor Register is very imperfectly kept; it would appear from it that very many persons are still inmates of the Union; when in point of fact they were discharged months ago. The daily diet book for the sick is full of errors and corrections and a great want of care is observable in the way nearly all the master books are kept. In the Relief list I found that in the case of a woman S. Saunders and her child, their names appear twice and consequently the Union is

As Mr Codd has given Notice that he will move on this day that the contract for advertising entered into with me for 12 months be broken. although I have entered into my contract and performed a portion of the work. I beg leave most respectfully to call your attention to a precedent on this point laid down for your guidance by your predecessor Mr E. Hore when Chairman in August 1884. for which I ask you to refer to the Minute Book. At that time the Guardians passed a resolution taking the advertisements from the Independent and giving them to "United Ireland." Mr John Redmond. handed in a "Notice of Motion" for the rescinding of that resolution same as Mr Codd in this instance. A special meeting was called to consider Mr Redmonds Motion but on the day appointed after the Clerk had read the Notice given by Mr Redmond the Chairman declined to put it stating that the contract had been entered into and that the Guardians were liable for the payment. The Guardians with the exception of Mr Redmond upheld the Chairmans decision. As a member of the Institute of Journalists, I now ask you to follow out the precedent laid down for your guidance and not to put this Motion. Regarding the remarks of some guardians saying that money expended on advertisements was waste I beg leave to say no one could substantiate that as if only one new tender received say for Flour Meat or Milk it might be the means of saving double the money

Mr Hore said Mr Hughes account of his action as Chairman in 1884 was correct but there was a great difference in this way. The

resolution which Mr Redmonds Notice of Motion proposed to rescind was arrived at by a very large Board of Guardians all present. and voting only a very small minority for Mr Hughes. In the present case the resolution proposing to be rescinded was passed at a Board where ~~only~~ five Guardians only voted three for and two against.
