The Hospital tins are daily got in the waggons and ashpits fearing Miss Scallan or I might get them in the dayrooms. there is a screw loose somewhere but one would think where there are 4 paid officials with locks and keys. this cursed traffic should be stopped

The Chairman (Mr Hore) after the report was read stated that although it did not come within the scope of their inquiry things turned up showing that within the past ten days the Master had taken strong drink. They inquired into the matter pretty closely but could not get evidence enough to call on the Master to resign or to invite a sworn investigation so they deemed to let the matter rest. They think they are acting the Master's best friends in drawing public attention to the matter and hope it will have the desired effect. The Master came before the Board and stated that he did not intend that the letter should be made public and that he would strictly attend to the recommendations of the Committee. Regarding the drunk part alluded to by Mr Hore he said he had a severe attack of diarrhoea and had taken the drink medicinally.

The Matron stated that she had no recollection of ever sending impertinent messages to the funds and but if she did she desired to express her great regret for having done so.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

The Master stated he received a letter from the Medical Officer of Ennisceothly Lunatic Asylum requesting him to send for 3 patients belonging to the workhouse who were no longer to be detained and were quiet but incurable. One of the patients were from the workhouse the other two were from the Wexford Union—outside the workhouse. The Master removed the patient which was sent from the workhouse but did not remove the others without consulting the Board.

Ordered: approved and the Guardian interested and the Relieving Officer to make every inquiry as to the two patients from outside the workhouse whether they are destitute &c and report to the Board on next Saturday. The Master to inform the Asylum Medical Officer of the Guardians order in the matter.

The Clerk stated that through some mistake in the postal arrangements the Tenders for meat were not delivered on Saturday morning the 28<sup>th</sup> ultimo. He found them (endorsed Tender for meat) on Sunday morning and thought it better to open them. He found L. Kewins tender was 5½<sup>d</sup> per lb while J. Hourke the old Contractor tendered at 6<sup>d</sup>. He advised the Master (who had got Sundays meat from the old contractor) to get the meat from Kewins until today when the Board could give directions. This advice the Master followed.

Ordered:— approved, and that Lawrence Kewins tender to supply the Best beef (without bone) for three months at 5½<sup>d</sup> per lb be now accepted.

The Committee appointed to inquire into the allegations contained in the Masters letter to the Medical officer reported as follows:—

The Masters letter is very incorrect and grossly exaggerates the state of things complained of. He states that the traffic is of frequent occurrence and that the quart of tea got by the Matron was only a "daily sample". This altogether incorrect as he could not remember any other occasion of a similar occurrence and the Matron could only recollect 3 cases of traffic within the past 12 months. He states that any one with pencil can get daily supplies of bread, meat, tea and eggs too, and instanced one case where a man had meat for his breakfast daily. This is incorrect as the man named had it only two or at most three times and stated that he had got the meat in the town and brought it in and cooked it. Neither the Master nor Matron could give a single instance where there was traffic for money. The Committee however found out one instance where traffic for pencil took place both in the Hospital and Infirmary part of the House, but it was of a very harmless nature indeed. The Master himself admitted that there was much less traffic now in the House than formerly. There was not the slightest proof that tins of tea were quite plenty over in the women's day room and in fact it appears to be a pure imagination. The statement that "we get eggs coming down by the half dozen" is very misleading, as only on one occasion were eggs found out of Hospital and this case was where a woman had not eaten the egg allowed her, but kept it and sent the Half dozen down at the end of the week by a little girl that visited her. We think this statement particularly wrong as an insinuation was thrown out that the eggs were not belonging to the woman but belonging to an infant child in her charge. We have great pleasure in stating that every child and every idiot who is allowed an egg has that egg given to them and are fed by one of the Sisters. When the Sisters complained that the Bread is short, the meat is short, or the stimulants are short we believe that in every case they had good reason as we are informed that sometimes they have to send as many as four different messengers down before the full quantity allowed goes up. We are given to understand that the messengers are frequently sent back by the Master and Matron with grossly impertinent messages to the Sisters. This is very wrong indeed. Regarding the eggs and the "three more" which the Sisters sent down for we believe that the Masters charge is a mere quibble, and for the best of all reasons that he has <sup>now</sup> gone back to the old system that has always prevailed and by which no error could occur and we recommend that this system be continued. The Hospital tins are not found daily in the waggons and ash pits, on the contrary the supply of tins for the past years is not nearly so large as formerly. Mr Kewins says there is a screw loose somewhere we think there is but it is certainly not in the Hospital, a part of the House, it is always a great pleasure to visit. Mr Kewins winds up his explanation as follows:— "My explanation about sending the report to Dr Sheridan and not to the

"the Board was thinking he might put a stop to it"  
 "I mean by four paid officials the four Sisters. but I did not mean anything"  
 "disrespectful"

"The reason I did not report to the Board about the little girl on whom"  
 "the eggs were found was that the Girl was the daughter of very decent people"  
 "whom I did not wish to bring before the public."

We believe Mr. Swins letter to be a tissue of misstatements from beginning to end. as in scarcely a single instance will they bear investigation

We think the Master and Matron should be severely reprimanded for their conduct towards the Sisters. and we hope that this system of petty annoyances which have been carried on will now cease.

We believe a system of traffic has been carried on between the Hospital and healthy department. This is encouraged by a ~~happy~~ habit which the Matron and Porter have of allowing some Infirm inmates to retain pence sometimes up to one shilling. about their person when going in. This should be put a stop to

During the investigation we found that there were two means of communication between the Hospital and Infirm part of the house through which the traffic could be carried on. It will be an easy matter to stop this. and we recommend that such alterations as are necessary in the structure of these places should be carried out.
