This is owing to the position of the water cistern which is placed in the central part of the house, and on a lower level than the taps in the Hospital. I have a plan now matured to remedy this defect—and the cost estimated—perhaps the Board would take it into consideration.

the brain caused by a fall into a small stream ~~upon the~~ or at least into the bed of the said stream upon the said Farm

(Signed) Edward Kearns Foreman.
Inquest held on the 27th June 1891

The following is the Medical Officers report:—
"I knew Dwyer who was found dead a week ago in the stream running through the workhouse grounds who never as far as I can recollect complained to me of any disease whatever. I have no doubt that his death was purely accidental.

M J Sheridan

It appears that on the morning of the 26th June this old man got up rather early and went out on the farm before breakfast. The Master sent a man out to look for him. He was found lying in the bed of a stream (nearly dry) about 10.30. A.M. o'clock quite dead. He never complained of his eyesight but it turned out at the inquest that he was nearly blind being affected from cataract.

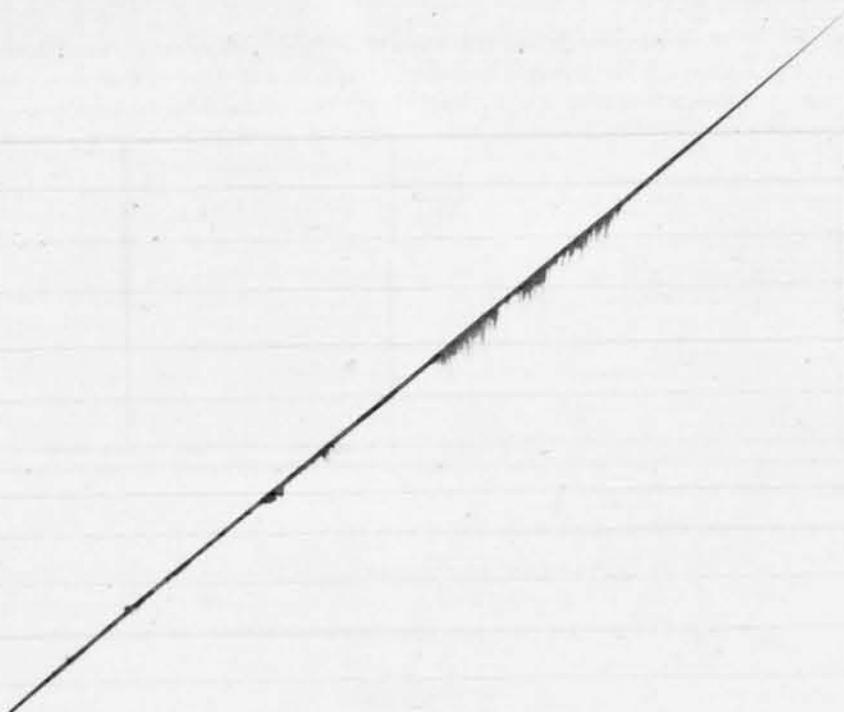

No 34.403. 5th August 1891. addressed to the Presiding Chairman, and enclosing a communication from Col Magrath J.P. complaining of the omission of his name from the Parliamentary Voters Lists and requesting the Guardians observations thereon.

Col Magrath's letter stated that on examining the Voters Supplemental List for North Wexford, he found his name not included notwithstanding that he had filled in a "Paper". He also stated that on Monday the 3rd inst. he attended at the office of the Clerk of the Union and the Lad he saw there informed him that there was no regular hour for the Clerk to attend.

He further stated that he had attended at the office of the Clerk of the Peace, and sent in his claim for a Vote, and that he would have to attend before the Revising Barister to maintain his claim.

The Chairman asked the Clerk to make any observations he wished on the matter.

The Clerk stated that he wished to contradict the statement that he had no regular hours of attendance at his office. He generally arrived there between 10 and 11 o'clock A.M. and hardly ever later than 11.30 A.M. unless on the Board's business somewhere else. He remained in his office until 6 o'clock P.M. — sometimes indeed until 9.30 P.M. — when very busy. Regarding Col Magrath's name not been on the Voters Lists, he wished to say that he took his name correctly down on his list (produced) and handed over the list to be copied by his Assistant. He then sent it on to the Clerk of the Peace, and on examining the printed list, found that the name had been changed from "Magrath, John Richard" to "U'Gash John" he could not say whether it occurred in the copying or in the Printers office, but he had noted the matter immediately on receiving the lists, and he intended to have the name corrected before the Revising Barister. However he was glad Col Magrath had taken up the matter himself.

Resolved unanimously:— "The Board having heard" "the Clerks explanation are ^{quite} satisfied with it. The also" "wish to express their disapproval of the apparently vindictive" "action of Col Magrath in writing to the Local Government" "Board, without first writing to the Clerk for an" "explanation as to why his name did not appear properly spelled."

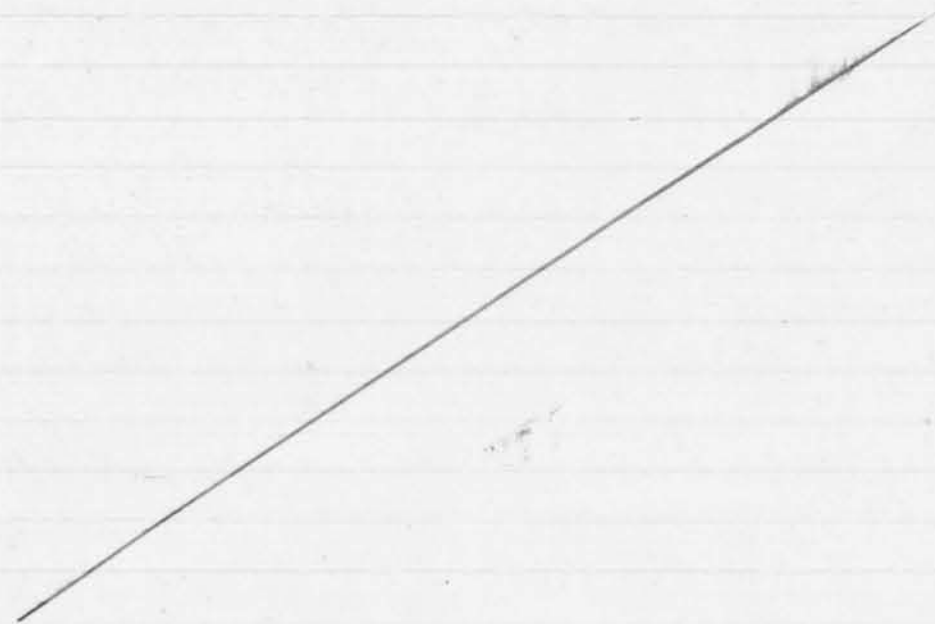

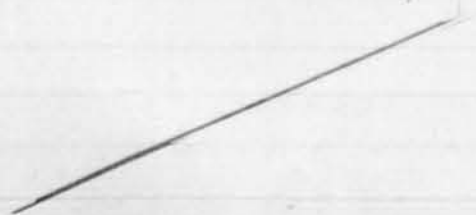

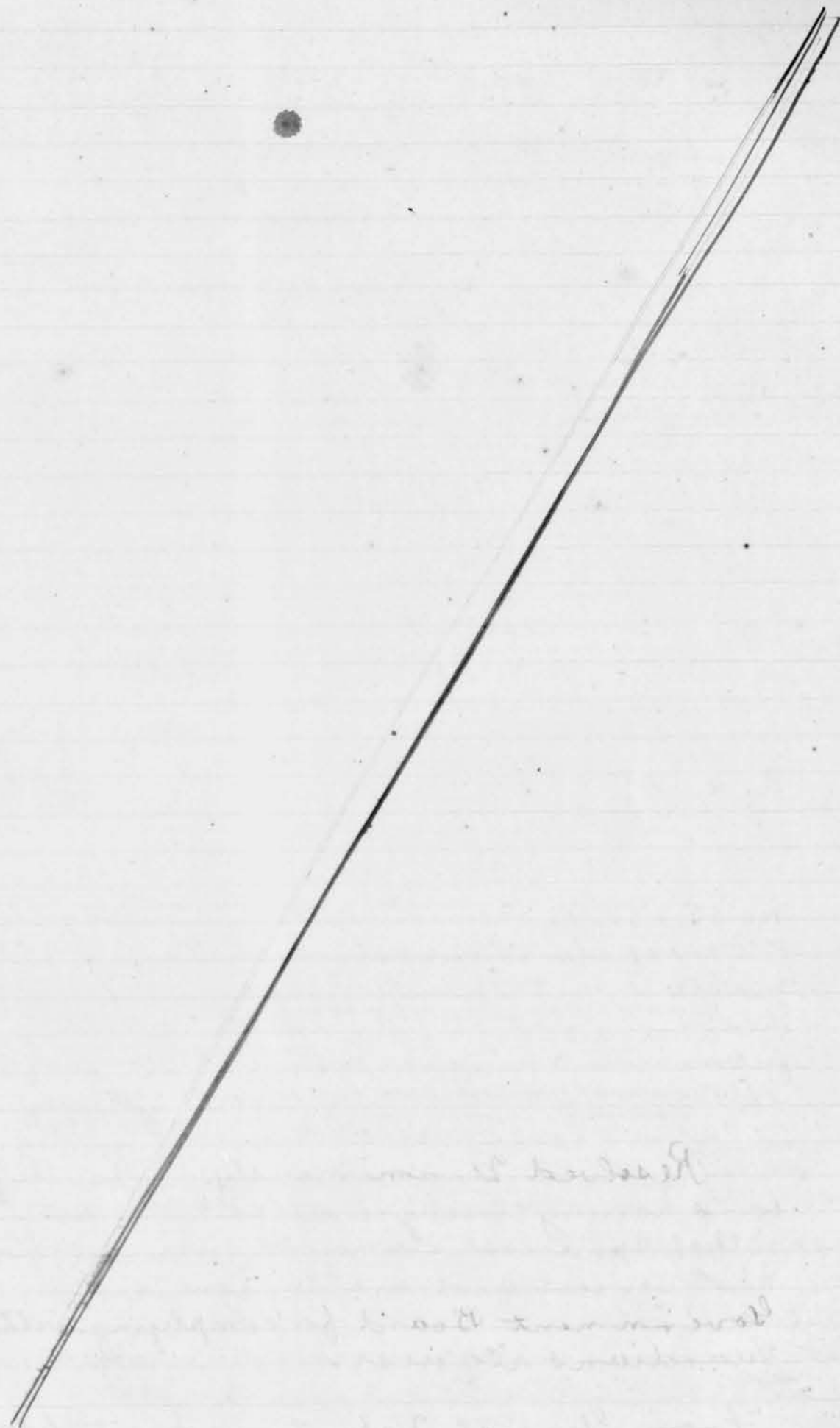
