The Return relates to the number and ages of persons in receipt of Indoor and Outdoor Relief on 1st January 1892, and also the number in receipt of Relief for the year ending 25th March 1892 — taking care not to reckon the same number twice.

The Clerk stated that the Return arrived on Thursday and was most difficult to make out. He was doing his best and with the masters assistance he hoped to be able to make the Return fairly correct by about Tuesday evening.

Resolved — That we think it unfair to ask our Officers to forego these Returns and others required by Parliament, and that one requiring so much care and trouble to make out should be properly paid for by the Imperial Exchequer.

No 16,639. 29 April 1892. Enclosing a letter which they had received from Patrick Murphy relating to his discharge from the Workhouse and requesting the Guardians to furnish them with their observations on the subject.

Murphy's letter stated that he was prosecuted by the Guardians on two charges, which fell through for want of evidence; that the master gave him a good character. The Board made an order for himself and his family to be put out of the house; that his wife is in a delicate state of health and one of his children is in Hospital, and that there are many young fellows in the house without any encumbrance.

The Board having ascertained that this man Murphy and his family had settled down in the Workhouse for the past five years (except one month annually, when in training in the night)

they made an order that he be discharged on Monday last. He was accordingly discharged. He came in again on Monday night and took his discharge again on Thursday — leaving his delicate child in the ~~house~~ Hospital.

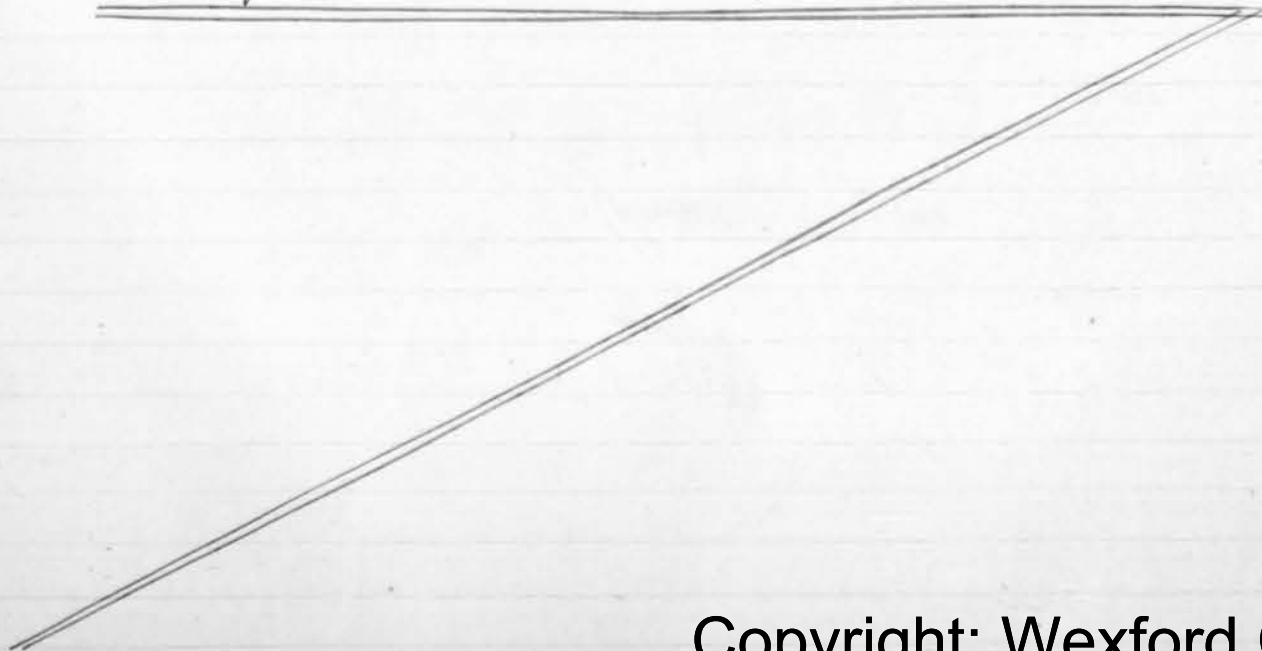

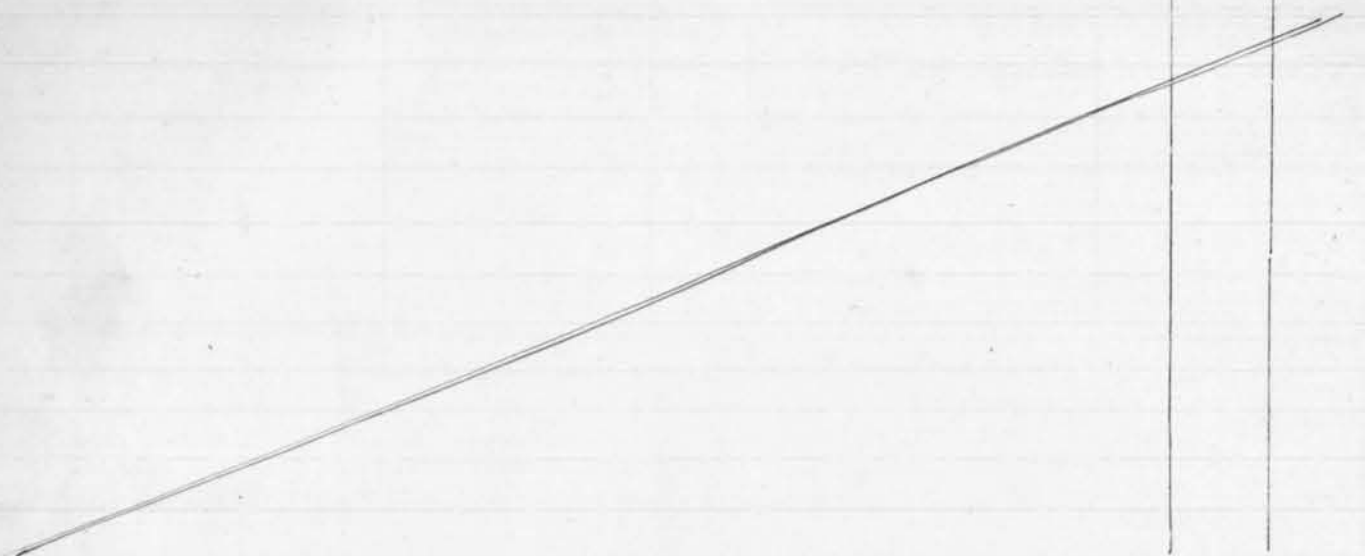

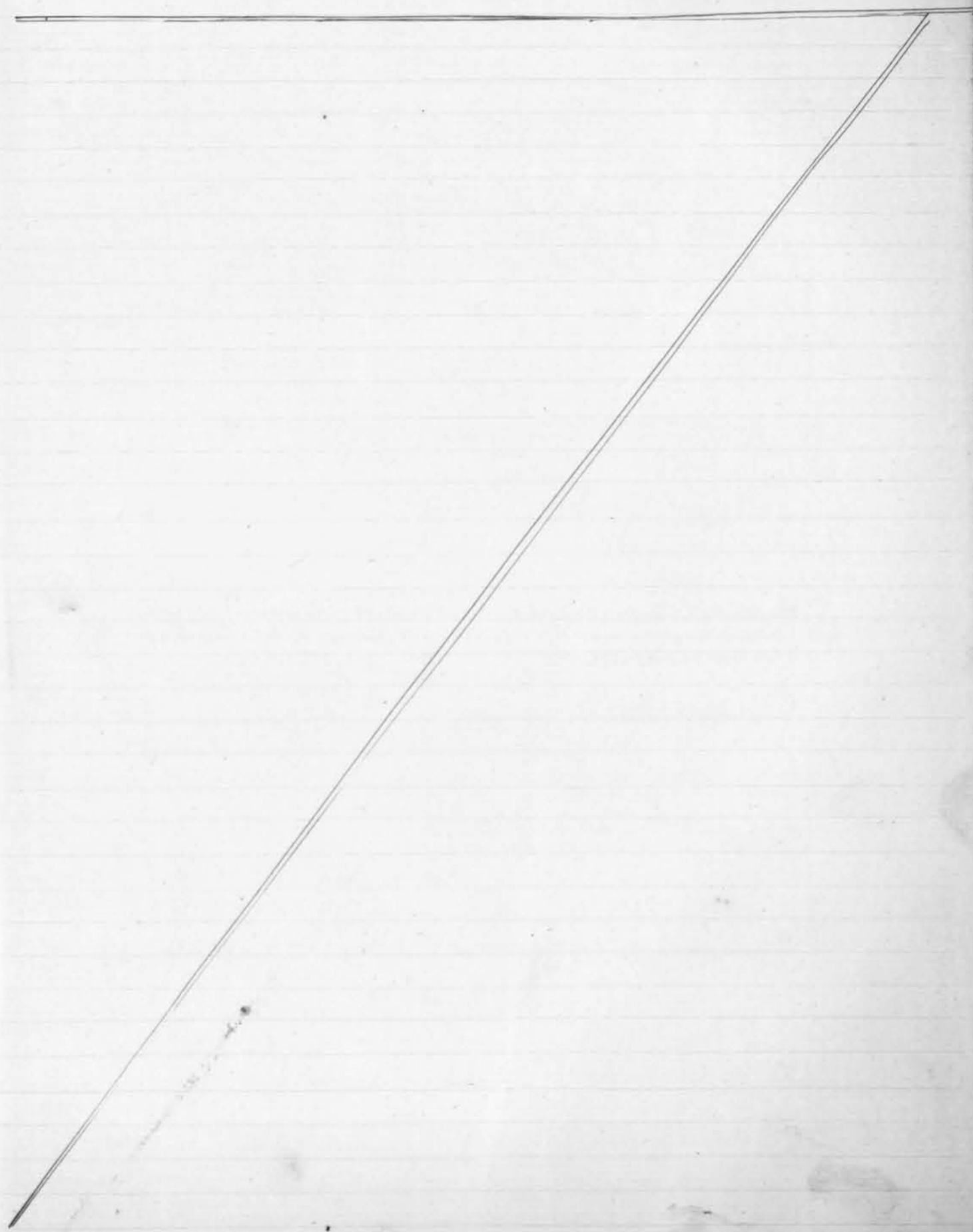
