no 25, 22, 23 the June 1893 L. G. Board Advertising to minutes of the 10th Inst. relative to the surcharge made by the Auditor Mr Croker against Mr F. Dillon Collector of Rents of Cottages they referred this minute to the Auditor & enclose a copy of his reply which says "I certainly cannot agree to allow the Collector 18/- in Murrays case & 21/- in Roches case & having regard to the number of times I spoke to him in reference to the cases & also my reports as to the unsatisfactory manner in which he discharges his duties as Rent Collector. I am of opinion he should be called on to pay the full amount of the surcharges forthwith."

Resolved:— That it would be hardly fair to charge Mr Dillon (who died on the 21st inst) for the time he was employed in evicting the tenant from the Cottage & the time of advertising for a new tenant. The Guardians further think that if the Rent Collector has the sole power of evicting a tenant without consulting the Guardians very great cases of hardship might ensue.

The Rent Collectors in this Union submit a monthly Report one column of which shows the amount of rent in arrears and the Guardians have given direction that they would not consider a tenant hardly in arrears who did not owe over 13 weeks rent.

The Guardians consider this monthly Report. & after hearing the explanation of the Rent Collector & sometimes making other inquiries they order either that the house be taken or the tenant warned.

The Guardians hope the L. G. Board will represent the case in a favourable light to the Auditor with a view to his complying with the Guardians recommendation as expressed in last minutes.

In the case of Ellen Plunkett no 2 the Relieving Officer, has given £2:8:0 without any authority whatever & therefore disallow the sum of £2:8:0 & surcharge same against Walter Doyle the Relieving Officer, who made the payments in like manner the sum of 18/- has been paid to a nurse in the case of Eliza Bartly no 289 & I must disallow the sum of 18/- & hereby surcharge same against Walter Doyle the Relieving Officer who paid the money with any authority. No sanction has been produced to me for the payment of 15/- to late Relieving Officer Dillon for services in connection with Vaccination. I shall be compelled to disallow this item at my next audit should the required sanction not be produced. The state of Rent Collection in late Relieving officers Dillon's district, at close of half year was exceedingly unsatisfactory and in the event of the Union sustaining any loss by want of energy in collecting the rents as the became due I must hold his securities responsible. The sum of £1:2:6 Poor Rate on the Dispensary House has been charged in error to the Labourers Act account the error can be rectified at close of current half year. I observe that payments have been made to small Contractors & others for work done or purporting to have been done but for which no certificates from any responsible persons have been produced to me I must decline to pass such payments in future without proper certificates. The result of the stock taking on the resignation of the Master in December last of clothing, Bedding, & Clothing materials showed a deficiency in some instances and an excess in others the deficiencies are not very serious & I am therefore not disposed to hold the late Master accountable for them. There appear however to have been serious deficiencies in Provisions & he but as he made good all such deficiencies it will not be necessary for me to take any action in regard to them.

In reference to my surcharges against late R. D. Dillon, I have to state he was unable to give me any information as to the time it took to take up possession of the cottages but I am now informed that it took 5 weeks in one case & 9 weeks in the other & I am willing that payment of the surcharges should be reduced 14/-.

Heill, in his letter, charges the Doctor with leaving the classification of patients in the hands of the Master whereby he was placed on punishment diet though being a fit case for Inferior Diet. He also states that the Schoolmaster has a key which opens the door leading out into the land, by which means he can leave the Workhouse without the Porter's knowledge, and calls attention to the fact that a boy named Doyle is allowed to sleep up in Hospital every night instead of sleeping in the Dormitory with the other boys.

The Medical Officer came before the Board and stated that the charges were untrue

as to classification were untrue and that he looked on Heill as a proper person to be on Hall diet.

The two persons alluded to by Heill as being admitted on Inferior Diet were so classified because they had been discharged off Inferior Diet only a day or two before when going out. Heill and the Schoolmaster came before the Board and the former behaved in a boisterous manner.

The Schoolmaster stated that his key would open the side door but denied that he ever used it except while acting as Master when he went out on the land very early to look after crows that were lying on the corn. The Doctor said, regarding the boy Doyle, that he was either subject to or counterfeited fits and would awaken in the middle of the night imagining he saw the ghost of some other boy and roar and quail among once to everyone else. He accordingly removed him for sleeping purposes to Hospital.

The Guardians directed that the Master should get the locks refitted so that there should be no pass key except the Master's, the Matron's and the Medical Officer's. The Guardians were employed a very long time in investigating these charges and find that except the Schoolmaster's having a pass key of the side door, the remaining charges were unsustained.

Unanimously Resolved — That a considerable portion of the Guardians time has lately been wasted in investigating letters sent to the L.G. Board by pauper inmates; such inmates think they have a triumph over the Guardians when the L.G. Board direct the latter to furnish observations on such letters. The Guardians are of opinion that the Local Government Board should reply to such letters by directing the paupers to lay any complaint they had before the Guardians directly. Unless this is done in future the Guardians cannot undertake to furnish observations on such letters.

Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts

No 35.09. 11 Oct. 93. - Veterinary Department forwarding a copy of the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act of 1893, which will come into force on the 1st Nov. next. The Act confers special powers on the Central Authority regarding Swine Fever and payment of compensation.

14 Oct 93. From Mr Malone V.S., Vet. Inspector to Local Authority and Postal Inspector, concerning the granting of compensation to owners of pigs slaughtered by the Local Authority as being affected with Swine Fever, and suggesting that the provisions of the Act, adopting the Compensation Clauses, should be put in force in this Union, for the following reasons:-

(1) Owners of pigs think hard in reporting the existence of the disease when they know that if the animal is slaughtered they will receive no compensation.

(2) Disease generally exists amongst pigs belonging to the poorer classes on whom it is particularly hard not to be paid, and

(3) it has been operating in Gorey Union without being, as suggested by some members of the Local Authority, abused.
