"I will move on this day fortnight that as the private practise of the Medical Officer of the Broadway District, together with the present salary, is insufficient to support his position, and as it is not in the interest of the sick poor to have Doctors leaving the District so frequently the salary be increased from £100 to £125 per annum."

No 20. 776 24 June 1894 Enclosing a copy of a Report made by the Boards Engineering Inspector Mr Deane, on his Inspection, and requesting to be informed of the cause of delay in proceeding with the erection of the remaining seven houses included in the Scheme, and Authorized by the Provisional Order dated 2nd November 1892. They also desire to be furnished on Form D. with a statement of expenditure incurred by the Guardians in connection with the Scheme.

Mr Deane's report: - I inspected four cottages which were in progress upon former inspection, and have to report that they are completed, making a total of 48 under this Scheme, the defects pointing out in former report have been made good.

Ordered: - Four of the seven ^{houses} ~~cottages~~ alluded to are at present in progress, of the remaining three, No 56 the landlord will not reply to communications offering a fair sum for the land, No 69 the site is in occupation for the present of a subtenant, and the Guardians do not like to enter without the authority of the Arbitrator. No 79. The tenant refuses the case must go before the Arbitrator.

The Guardians think it would be needless expenditure of money to bring down the Arbitrator for these three houses only, and they have accordingly postponed them, until he shall be required for the new Scheme.

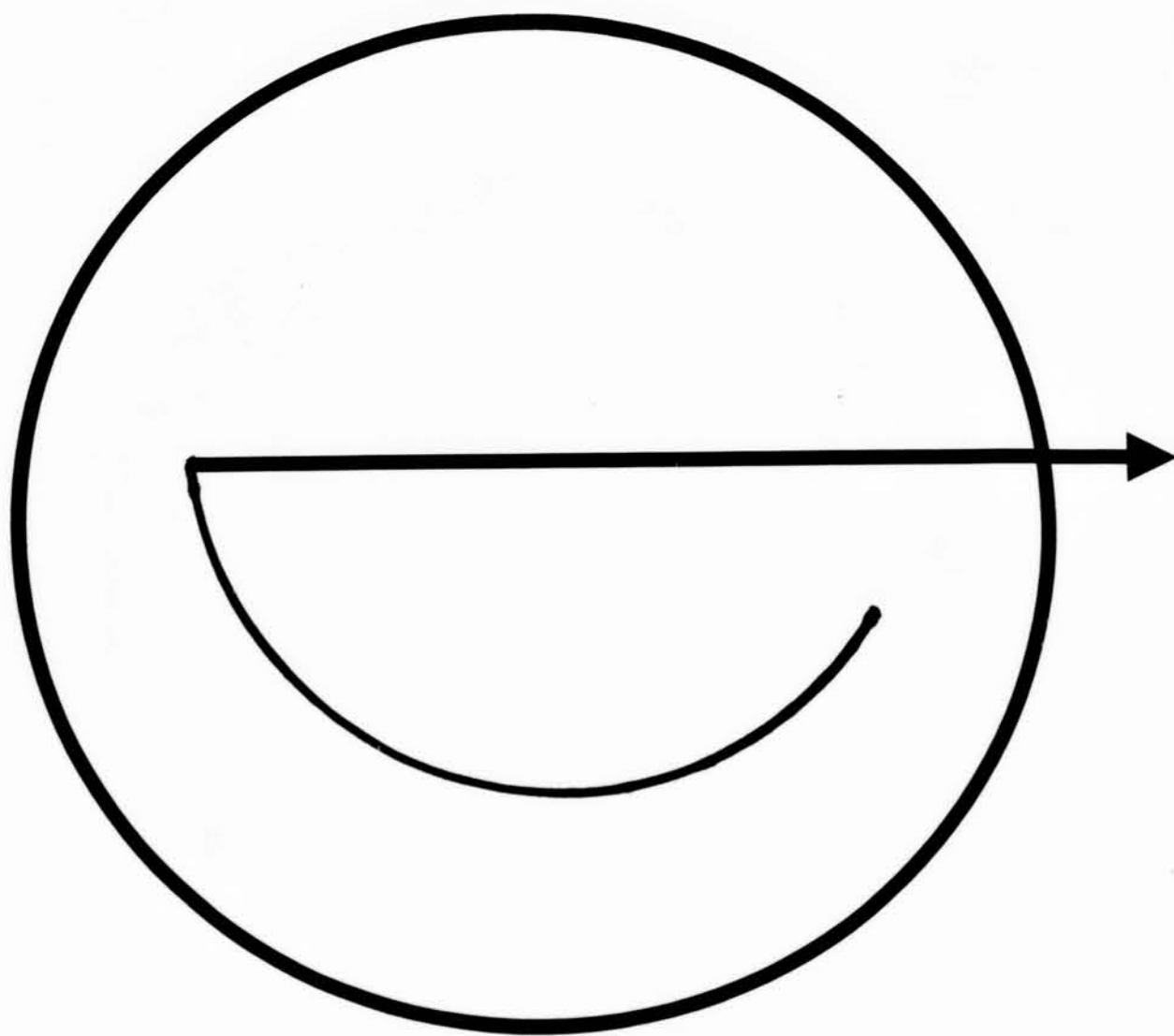
