Mr. Lynch Staunton will give notice to all persons concerned of the time fixed for holding the inquiry.

Referring to the Local Government Board Inspector's Report:—

The Matron was called before the Board and stated she would be very glad to get an Assistant and not applied for one.

The Medical Officer attended and not only strongly recommended hot and cold water baths (which would be of an immense advantage in cases of rheumatism

and other diseases) but said that if a neat cleanly hospital were required they should also have Water Closets (two) one for the men and one for the women.

The Medical Officer also said that 12 beds for the Fever Hospital were woven &c. same as last supplied to the house, would be a very great acquisition.

It was resolved that the consideration of the Matron's and Medical Officer's statements be referred to the Board of next Saturday for final settlement.

No 3768 1895. 6<sup>th</sup> February 1895. Relating to the Inquiry as to the dirty condition of the children as appear in the Guardians Minutes of the 8<sup>th</sup> December last. On the 5<sup>th</sup> Dec. the Medical Officer was called <sup>upon</sup> to visit five girls in their Dormitory. He went and was accompanied on the occasion by Sister Michael and an inmate named Mary Hirwan. The Medical Officer complained of their dirty state and said "Look at the dirt of the children isn't that child's feet very filthy to go before a lady" meaning Sister Michael. Doctor Sheridan stated that one child Margaret Berry - was very dirty and that the dirt was ground into the skin as far as he could see. While Sister Michael states "I thought that one of the children's feet were not clean. I should say they were dirty from what I saw. It was not disputed that Margaret Berry had no bath for four weeks. The other girls were bathed more or less on the previous days."

but the Schoolmistress did not personally supervise the proceeding - on reviewing the whole evidence the Local Government Board request the Guardians to request the Schoolmistress to give more attention and care in performing her duties in giving a closer personal attention to the bodily condition of the children.

It appears that Mr. Irwin is not in the habit of communicating directly with the Medical Officer when serious matters arise in connection with the children's health and they think that this should be regarded as one of the most important duties she has to perform.

Minutes of evidence accompanied letter

The Schoolmistress was called before the Board and reprimanded by the Chairman. She promised to be very careful for the future.

If the town water can be procured it would meet their difficulty and also afford a pure drinking water for the inmates."

"reach the highest point of the buildings.

The Master Reported that on the 8th April, he received the following Telegram from Dr. Pigott. "Send car without delay here urgent case" He sent the ordinary cover car at once, and it returned about 7 o'clock p.m. bringing a patient named Anne Doran, who in the usual manner was sent direct to Hospital, Dr. Pigott sent the following note by the carman, "Please admit Bearer into Hospital who is suffering from a very dangerous skin disease which might develop itself into something of a more serious nature." I immediately went to see the case, and found the sister had her sitting at the fire with Blankets around her. She advised that the Doctor he sent for, this was done & he reported it as a case of smallpox, and I had her at once transferred to the Fever Hospital sheds, and a pauper nurse sent along with her. On the 16th April I received the following Telegram, from Dr Pigott at 8 o'clock p.m. "Urgent send Fever Hospital car for Doran's family & in smallpox." I had heard that Doran's family had left our Union, and I wired to Dr. Pigott next morning "Where I was to send." he replied, "In Taghmon send car immediately." I sent the car and 6 persons were brought back from Taghmon, all the one family, at 2 o'clock p.m. on the same evening I again sent & brought the remainder into the Fever Hospital sheds. I had the car which I sent on the first occasion properly disinfected & the cushions burned. On the other occasions I sent the Fever Hospital car, and had it disinfected thoroughly after each journey.

Mr Walter Doyle San. Lab. Officer, reported:- I received a Telegram on the 17th inst. from Dr Pigott Taghmon, telling me to go there & bring some disinfecting fluid with me. I did so & found a family of tinkers just had been removed from the road side outside Taghmon all of them (except four) suffering from smallpox.

They left a Donkey, car, & some tinware behind them, no one would let the donkey & car in. I therefore had them removed to the Fever Hospital and got them properly cleansed & disinfected. Dr Pigott recommended that the Donkey & car should be destroyed, but I did not do so until I consult the Board.

Dr Stafford Local Government Board Inspector visited the Fever Hospital & made the following suggestions. (1) To prevent any of the inmates of the Hospital to visit the Town. (2) To have the officials of the Fever Hospital to instruct the master not to allow any communications (See Page 300)

A Report was received of the examination of the girls, in the Workhouse School by Mr Macmillan, Inspector. Speaking of the Workhouse of the School generally fair progress may be said to have been made during the year. Nearly all read & prescribe lessons with tolerable ease & correctness, but some appear to understand very imperfectly the sentences read. Writing might be somewhat more neat & regular. Maps are fairly well known. Girls sew & knit expertly for their ages, and most of their seams were fairly neat. Girls were neat, clean, and well-behaved.

There were only eight infants all under seven years of age for examination. These had made as much progress in learning to read as desirable, in children so young. They have also had exercises in numbers, &c. suited to their age. I would suggest that some more pictures of a suitable character be provided, and also some simple Kindergarten materials, such as blocks, sticks for stick-laying, & drawing copies with suitable slates. The cost would be very trifling, & the requisites referred to, would provide interesting occupation & provide very useful in training the senses and the hands of these infants, whose lives are rather uniform & whose opportunities of observation are limited.

It was stated that the Fever Hospital messenger, was seen in various shops in town, and an order was made that the Fever Hospital messenger, be kept altogether inside, unless in an extreme case of necessity, — when he is only to be sent to the Workhouse Gate, by the Back way, that the messenger from the Workhouse is to call three times each day at the Gate of the Fever Hospital to take messages.

The Doctor (Sheridan) reported that the cases were ~~progressing~~ progressing favourably. The woman Doran (the first patient) is convalescent, her husband, his sister, and her daughter, are very sick, all necessary precautions are being taken and the nurses are giving every satisfaction.

"What part of the house was set apart for the accommodation of such cases for the same reason, I did not send for the car provided for the Fever Hospital, I may add "I was never called on to examine or prescribe for any of these cases which I have sent "in. In the first instance some of the Dorans came to my Dispensary for ointment on "Questioning them I considered it advisable to see the person who required. When I saw "her I knew I could not bring her into my Dispensary in which the District nurse "and her family reside. On the 30th Dr. Pigott sent a telegram inquiring what time I could send out the car and saying something indefinite about "Magistrate's Order" or that it should be procured, I immediately asking him if I could send Fever Car at once, and telling him I thought he ought to consult the Clerk of Union, Dr. Pigott would again telling me he had procured "Magistrate's Order," and that I was to send Fever Car on following day at 10 A.M. I did so and the patient came in. I sent word to Dr. Sheridan he visited the case and pronounced smallpox. On yesterday evening I received another telegram from Dr. Pigott hoping I would send for remainder of Furlong, included in "Magistrate's Order" and have them conveyed to to observation's Ward, I sent out car and wired Dr. Pigott to have "Magistrate's Order" produced then. The remainder of family three in number came in and went straight to Fever Hospital. Dr. Sheridan reported:—The girl Kate Furlong aged 12 years from New Bay was admitted to Fever Hospital this yesterday suffering from confluent smallpox all necessary precautions are being taken.

Relieving Officer Deveraux handed in Magistrate's Order for the removal of Kate Furlong who is suffering from smallpox and

N<sup>o</sup> 2760. 7<sup>th</sup> June 1845. Referring to the recent Inquiry in connection with the removal of Smallpox patients from Taghmon and enclosing minutes of evidence taken at the Inquiry. After reviewing the evidence regarding the removal of the girl Anne Doran on the 8<sup>th</sup> the report stated in reference to Dr. Pigott, Although his conduct is in a high degree censurable on this occasion, the Local Government Board believe that his action was owing rather to the want of experience and due consideration than to deliberate neglect of duty. Having regard to the fact that the Local Government Board have recently their attention called to the manner in which Dr. Pigott performs his clerical duties, showing that in some respects he is not a satisfactory Officer the Local Government Board have to state that in the event of any further well founded complaints being made against him, they will not hesitate to call for his resignation of the position of Medical Officer of the Taghmon Dispensary District.

Relating to the removal of the Dorans on the 16<sup>th</sup> the Board wrote We are willing to believe that if the Master knew that the patients had no lodging and were exposed on the roadside he would have at once dispatched the ambulance to Taghmon but at the same time they would point out that he incurred a grave responsibility and is deserving of censure for not sending promptly for these cases of Smallpox when the Medical Officer's message was of so urgent a nature. The Board consider it is much to be regretted that notwithstanding the fact that the Sanitary Authority provides two Ambulances and a numerous staff of Officials, it should have taken twenty four hours to remove the Doran family a distance of ten miles and the Board think the Sanitary Authority would do well to give their Officers more explicit instructions with regard to the prompt removal of cases of Infectious diseases to Hospital.

# LABOURERS ACTS.

From Mr Rich<sup>d</sup> of Spring J.P. Polehore relating to a cottage being erected at Muchwood (Scheme 1882) Glynn electoral Division He writes: It is simply a fraud, a scandal and a position waste of money.

The masonry as exposed to view is of the most worthless kind, the walling consisting chiefly of small sized stones laid in loosely bond of thorough stones being conspicuous by their absence and the so called mortar is made up of rabbit sand with a modicum of lime which crumbles by the slightest touch.

The underwork is also of a wretched class. The floor joists are laid into one of the walls only resting on 3/4 Board which should not in proper construction be there at all while the opposite ends of the joists are attached to a rough plank by paltry notices the said plank being supported in mid air by two temporary posts unconnected with the masonry.

I refrain from further comments, but would give timely warning that this cottage as it now stands must eventually and before much time elapses become a crumbling ruin and therefore as a ratepayer I must strongly protest against such a wretched erection being imposed upon the rates of this union.

In plain speaking the building should not be accepted under any condition. It should be pulled down to its foundation and rebuilt in proper manner.

There is not one word of truth in this letter. There is no rabbit sand used in this building the best pit sand that is in the locality is used. The same sand out of this pit has been used building a number of cottages and other works and was seen by the two engineers from the Local Government Board and no fault found.



with it. The stones were used in a building before more than half of them are large well shaped stones surely enough to supply coigns and bond stones for the building. There is the usual number of them laid in the wall. or bond or thorough stones. The wood used in the building was all inspected by me, and was good and according to Specification except in one instance namely in the Kitchen, the trimmer has not been well put up and I found fault with the contractor for the way in which he put up the trimmer and he promised to make the alteration which I pointed out to him, and which when made will bring the work in this respect within the Specification. This was only a small mistake on the part of the contractor and of course will be made ably.

to specification. The Juvins are defective. The stones used are not flat-bedded and spalls appear in the face of the work. The mortar joints are entirely too wide and the mortar is made with too fine a sand.

The brick work is also inferior especially in the recess for the cupboard in Gabelle walls. The walls appear to be plumb and I think if the joints of the masonry were deeply raked out and pointed in cement mortar externally, in addition to the rough casting specified it will make the house both sound and dry.
