In considering our financial position it would be well to bear in mind the following extract from the last report of the Local Government Board which explains in general terms the great difficulty from a financial point of view in which the bounty bouncils found themselves when they took up the fiscal administration of the bounty:

One of the chief difficulties which the new

One of the chief difficulties which the new bounty bouncils had to face was the striking and levying of a rate to mut their requirements after they came into office.

The Agricultural Grant which had accumulated during the six months prior to 14 April

was paid over to the new bouncils, and enabled them to finance the Guardians and Rural District Councils to a certain extent; but this Grant was, of lourse, wholly inadequate to meet the expenditure for any considerable portion of the half year. Power was given by the Local Government (Transitory Provisions) (no 2) order in bouncil to bounty and District Councils, and to Boards of Guardians to "borrow, with our approval, to meet their "esopenditive pending the striking and reollection of the new rates. This power was largely used owing to the necessarily late period at which it was possible to sticke and put in collection the first rates, under the act, and without such a power the business of the country could "not possibly have been earried on"

The Westford bounty bouncil could have availed themselves of this power, but wisely preferred to meet their liabilities as far as possible, without imposing upon the Ratepayers a liability that might have taken years to clear off and would have ereated an undistrable legacy for their successors Borrowing, to tide over the crises might have had its advantages on the score of exceedincy and popularity, but when the result meant a continuous charge for years there would have been subsequent murmers as to the wisdom of the step. It was unpleasant to be compelled owing to the faulty construction of the Local Government Act to adopt measures which may have led some to suspect the bounty bouncil of extravagance or waste, or of imposing taxation without necessity, but the policy we adopted was the sound policy and its effects will be felt in years to come.

The decrease in the amount reparable on loans (outside of asylum loans) arises from the natural reduction of the indebtedness to the Board of works.

ment in reland, omit to make allowance for the initial difficulties we are compelled to face.

With reference to union and District Council expenditure. I submit no figures for obvious reasons. It is for the various Boards of Guardians and District Councils to excamine and agree to their own estimates. The bounty bounced have no power to enterfere with the demands of these bodies beyond a request for an explanation as to particular items. The able officials by whom this bouncil are faithfully served, are as anxious as anyone in the county to see the rates go down, and they work energetically towards that end. The bounty bountil have been as eareful of the bounty funds, as if they were dealing with their own money, and the ratepayers I trust, will find in the course of another year that their representatives on the premier bounty body in their action as bounty bouncellors have consulted the true interests of the bounty and are able to render a good account of their stewardship.

We consider he is not a suit-Table servant for this bouncil and would "point to the fact that on the 6th August 1900 the admitted he was to blame for the neglect of Ferry carrie Bridge though he gave the futile reason that a great deal of extra work had been put on him for the previous six months. And in view of all these evicumstances we recommend the bouncil to call upon ul Webster to resign his position."

Me Webster submitted the following statement-

With your permission, I beg to make

a few remarks on the resolution before you. With regard to the east of the maintenance of the three bridges, put down as being £1106.5%= for the past five years I wish to point out of this total as sum of 6 480 " 10 "0, was spent on Westford Bridge for painting and tarring and surface repairs only, the balance for Ferry caving and Deeps Bridges would be only £625. 15.0. This expenditure in five years on all the repairs (including painting and laving) of two timber structures cannot, be considered lavich. on Mountgarrett Bridge there is no maintenance Contract, and yet I find that the expenditure for repairs on this bridge averages between £ 90 and £ 100 per annulm. and this budge is much smaller than Ferrycarrig Bridge my Ryan Estimate of £ 500 for Terrycarrig Bridge

included new iron handrails and new machincluded new iron handrails and new machinery as well as a new arrangement of the flooring.

The Finance bommittee are in error in their statement that in November 1900, I reported that it would take & 216 - 16 . 9 to make the bridge perfectly safe. That estimate of mine was for putting the bridge in perfect order, which is a totally different thing to making it perfectly safe. I may say that the bridge is being put into very good repair without any excital expenditive over the maintenance contract

with regard to weeeford Bridge, the fact that we Ryan estimates that a sum of only k 105 is required to make the bridge perfect is a point in my favour especially when you bear in mind that we Ryan had gone out of his way to find fault as pointed out in my written reply to his report dated the 2nd of last month. The paragraph about my admission of neglect of Ferry carrier Bridge is in my opinion unfair and misleading. The fact that I had the

because a couple of timbers escaped my attention when pointing out to the old Contractor the work I required to be done, ought not to be construed into an admission that I was to blame for my neglect of the bridge. Taking everything into consideration, it is hardly necessary for me to add that to request me to resign my appointment would be in my opinion, unjustifiable and I am willing to face the stricted enquiry into the matter.

Security of Checkers.

That the clerks of the Unions of Bescford, Enniscorthy and Gorey and Will y Finn NewRoss, be requested to enter into security by a Guarantie Society as Escaminers and bheckers of the Rate bollectors' Accounts for the due performance of their duties in the sum of £500.

Reports to be made by Checkers.

That the Checkers and Escaminers of the apost of the Rate bollectors be directed to forward to the Sicretary a special report in the event of any collector not appearing on the date fixed for the escamination of his books, this report to be forwarded on the same date on which the bollector fails to appear, and that he also furnish the Secretary with his confidential views on the manner in which the bollector, whose conduct is thus brought under notice is performing his duty, and that the Secretary thereupon call the Finance bommittee together to deal with the matter.

That the checkers will be held strictly responsible for the reconcilement of the amounts as shown per the bollectors' sheets with the amount of the warrant supplied to them, this duty to be performed to the satisfaction of the Secretary.

With regard to the question of the collection of the rate generally, the following recommendation was made:

bollections in some instances having been unsatisfactory we recommend the bounty bouncil to consider if the bollector is properly fulfilling his duty or is eligible for continuance of in office if he fails to collect his rates in equal or fair proportion in each month.

Security of Collectors.

With reference to the question of quarantees given by the bollectors, the Secretary was directed to ask the hocal Sovernment Board, "if the bouncil were in a position to change the existing securities, and eall on the bollectors to give security by an approved Guarantee Society"

Sovernment Board under date 7th june 1901 Letter no 51. 493 work that they considered the bounty bouncil may require any bollector to give the security of an approved Guaranter society, either in addition to, or in substitution for existing personal security. It appeared to the bocal Government Board, however, that in the case of existing bollectors the bouncil should defray the expenses earsed to any collector by reason of any change of security of this nature.
