

Annual Meeting 16th June 1903.

The Annual Meeting of the County Council was held in the Council Chamber, Court House, Wexford, on June 16th 1903.

Present- In the Chair, Mr. Edmond Hore, Vice-Chairman.

Other Councillors- Messrs D. Dempsey, J. E. Maylor, M. Browne, J. Donohoe, J. Bolger, J. Cummins, A. Kinsella, M. J. Furlong, R. King, D. Kavanagh, J. B. Hearn, J. Sinnott, J. A. Doyle, G. H. Peacocke, James Shearman, J. J. Walsh, J. Bolger, Michael Murphy, M. Hickey, J. D. Doyle, Lord Viscount Stopford, and M. A. Ennis, Mr. John. J. Kehoe, subsequently attended.

The Secretary, Mr. R. W. Elgee, Solicitor, and H. Webster, County Surveyor, were also present.

Declarations of Office

Messrs J. D. Doyle, M. Hickey, M. Murphy, and J. Bolger, representatives of Gorey, New Ross, Wexford, and Enniscorthy District Councils, subscribed the usual declaration of Office.

The minutes of last meeting were read and signed.

Election of Chairman

On the motion of Mr. Peacocke, seconded by Mr. Dempsey. Sir Thomas A. G. Esmonde Bart. M. P. was unanimously elected Chairman.

Election of Vice-Chairman

On the motion of Mr. Cummins, seconded by Lord Stopford, Mr. E. Hore, was unanimously elected Vice-Chairman of the Council.

Mr. Hore returned thanks for his election to this position.

Co-option of Councillor

The following letter under date, 25th May 1903, was read from Mr. John. J. Kehoe.

"Since my co-option as County Councillor my attention has been called to the fact

that I am surety for two road contractors - Messrs Edmund Pierce, Broadway, and Michael Wickham, Youngstown. I wish to vacate my suretyship, and I offer as my substitute - in Mr Pierce's case Mr Patrick Byrne, Bull Ring, Wexford, and in Mr Wickham's case, Mr Frank O'Connor, Main Street Wexford, both of whom are willing to sign the customary bond. These contracts were taken by the County Council, so that they have power to accede to this application which you will kindly lay before next meeting."

Permission to vacate Bond.

The following resolution was adopted on the motion of Mr Peacocke, seconded by Mr Dempsey.

"That we allow Mr John J. Kehoe, to vacate his suretyship as surety for Messrs Edmund Pierce, and Michael Wickham, road contractors, and accept in his place Mr Patrick Byrne, Bull Ring, Wexford, as surety for Mr Pierce, and Mr Frank O'Connor, Main Street, Wexford, as surety for Mr Wickham, as these gentlemen are willing to enter into the form of bond prescribed." That new bonds be entered into at once."

Declaration of Office.

Mr Kehoe, then subscribed the usual declaration of office, and took his seat as Councillor.

Appointment to Committees.

Mr Peacocke moved - "That Mr Michael Murphy, be appointed a member of the Finance Committee, and a member of the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts Committee, vice Mr James Bodd, late representative of the Wexford District Council.

The Chairman seconded the motion which was passed nem con.

On the motion of Mr Peacocke, seconded by Mr James Shearne, Mr John J. Kehoe, was appointed a member of the Finance Committee, the County Infirmary, Committee, and the District Asylum Committee. vice Mr Patrick Ryan deceased.

Election of Rate Collector -

Applications for the position of Rate Collector for No 10. Collection District, vacant through the death of Mr Patrick Dunne, were received - Moses Sutton, Ballyvake Cylegate, William Bruen, Rathnure, Edward Somers, Duncinane Enniscorthy, John Sinnott, Ballyland, Davidstown, and Moses Dunne, Knockmore.

In connection with the election the following recommendation of the Finance Committee was laid before the meeting.

"We direct our Acting Secretary to advertise for a Rate Collector for No 10. Collection District at a remuneration of 6^d poundage and statutory fees, the appointment to be made at the Annual Meeting of the Council, to be held on June 16th

That we request the Local Government Board to sanction the appointment of Mr Patrick Dunne, having regard to the fact that his late father, collector for this district, gave every satisfaction in the discharge of his duties, and that during his father's illness, Mr Patrick Dunne, dealt with the Rate Collection for March 1903 in a capable manner."

"That in the event of the Local Government Board refusing to entertain this proposal, we recommend the County Council to appoint up to 31st March 1904 Rate collector Somers as collector for the electoral divisions of Ballyhoque, Bree, and the Leap; that Mr Somers, if possible provide the security of a guarantee Society, personal security in the case of Mr Somers be accepted as he is an

existing collector, who has always carried out his duties properly".

That the Acting Secretary be directed not to issue advertisements for the position until he has received a reply from the Local Government Board.

With reference to the above recommendation the following letter under date, 21st May 1903 and no 29,603 Wexford County, from the Local Government Board was read:-

I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 16th instant relative to the appointment of Mr Patrick Dunne as collector of Poor Rate by the Wexford County Council and in reply. I am to state that having regard to the disqualification provided by the County (Poor Rate collectors) Order 1899 the Board regret that they feel themselves precluded from sanctioning Mr Dunne's appointment.

I am, however, to add that the Board will approve of temporary arrangements being made for the discharge of the duties of the vacant collectorship during the current financial year.

The Assistant Secretary explained that since the advertisement for the position had been issued he had received a communication from Mr Owen Connolly, Clerk of the Enniscorthy Rural District Council, that he had been obliged to have the work in connection with the laying down of franchise forms carried out as it did not admit of delay. He (Assistant Secretary) saw that all the candidates for the position were in attendance, and he wished to announce to them that the successful candidate would not receive any remuneration under the Parliamentary

roters Acts as the work had been already carried out. The appointment as the candidates could see from the advertisement was only for one year, up to March 1904.

Mr. Browne proposed and Mr. Kehoe, seconded the election of Mr. Somers.

Mr. Dempsey proposed, and Mr. Hickey, seconded the election of Moses Sutton.

Mr. Sinnott, was proposed by Mr. J. Bolger, and seconded by Mr. J. D. Doyle.

The remaining candidates were not proposed.

The following is the result of the first poll.
For Somers - Messrs Furlong, Browne, Kehoe, Peacocke, King, Donohoe, Ennis, and the Chairman - 8.

For Sutton - Messrs Mayler, Dempsey, Hearn, J. A. Doyle, Hickey, Cummins, Shearne, and Walsh - 8.

For Sinnott - Messrs J. D. Doyle, Kinsella, J. Bolger, Murphy, Sinnott, Kavanagh, J. Bolger, and Lord Stopford. 5.

The Chairman then gave his casting vote in favour of Somers, and a vote was then taken as between Messrs Sinnott and Sutton, as to which would be retained in the next poll.

For Sutton - Messrs Walsh, Mayler, Browne, Kehoe, Dempsey, Donohoe, Ennis, Hearn, J. A. Doyle, Hickey, Cummins, Shearne - 12.

For Sinnott - Messrs J. D. Doyle, Kinsella, J. Bolger, Furlong, Peacocke, King, Murphy, Sinnott, Kavanagh, J. Bolger, Lord Stopford and the Chairman. 12.

The Chairman gave his casting vote in favour of Sinnott, and the final poll was then taken as between Somers and Sinnott.

For Somers - Messrs Walsh, Furlong, Browne,

Ke hoc, Peacocke, King, Donohol, Ennis, Ahearne, J. A. Doyle, and the Chairman - 11.

For Sinnott. - Messrs J. D. Doyle, Kinsella, J. Bolger, Dempsey, Murphy, Sinnott, Hickey, Cummins, Kavanagh, Ahearne, J. Bolger, and Lord Stopford. - 12.

Mr. Mayler did not vote.

The Chairman then declared Mr. Sinnott elected.

Inquests held outside coroner's district. - Under date 25th May the following letter was read from Mr. Murphy, for North Wexford.

"I request you will be good enough to bring my claim for mileage in the 4 inquests, which I held outside my district, particulars of which you have again before your Council, for their direction to have the question submitted to the Local Government Board, for their decision as to whether a coroner is entitled to travelling expenses for holding inquests by request in another coroner's district, and let me know result."

A copy of this letter had been submitted to the Local Government Board, and they had replied (letter No. 31,662 Wexford County) that the Board are advised that having regard to the terms of section 3 of the Act 44 and 45 Vict. cap 35 which prescribes payment to a coroner of a fee of £2. for such inquests, no further allowance can properly be made."

The Finance Committee recommended that a copy of this letter should be furnished Mr. Murphy, and on the motion of Mr. Ennis seconded by Mr. Dempsey, the recommendation of the Finance Committee was confirmed.

Revision of valuation

Lists of cases for Revision of valuation were

submitted from the Poor Rate collectors of the County, and examined by the members.

The following resolution was proposed by Mr Peacocke, seconded by Mr Aharne, and adopted.

"That the list of cases for revision of valuation from the Rate collectors having been submitted to the Council, we consider the various revisions asked for should be carried out except in the following cases in Bridgetown - Messrs Joseph Murphy, Thomas Dunne, Thomas Cloney, Peter Rossiter, Mary O'Connor, and James Esmonde.

The following recommendation of the Finance Committee was confirmed on the motion of Mr Peacocke, seconded by Mr Kehoe,

"That the attention of Rate collectors J. Barron, and John Barden, be directed to the fact that they have not forwarded to the Offices of the Secretary of the County Council on or before the 15th June, as prescribed by Act of Parliament the list of cases in their district in which revision of valuation is necessary."

The Secretary stated that since the Finance Committee meeting had been held that morning Mr Barron's revision sheets had come to hand, but they should have been received the previous day.

Lowest Tender-Special Minute

Circular letter under date 21st May 1903 No 83 M. 1903 Miscellaneous, from the Local Government Board in reference to the prescribed form of minute under section 18 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1902 was read. It pointed out that in every instance in which the lowest tender is not accepted at an adjourned quarterly meeting a certificate to that

effect, signed by the clerk, or secretary, should appear on the minutes of such meeting. The Board observe that frequently the cause assigned for non-acceptance of the lowest tender is either the failure of the contractor or his sureties to attend at the adjourned quarterly meeting for the completion of the bond, or the supposition of the Council or Committee that the lowest tender is not genuine. The Board are of opinion that if Rural District Councils, and Proposal Committees required the lodgment of a deposit of a reasonable sum with all tenders for Public Works, the condition would probably have the effect of preventing all but bona-fide contractors from sending in tenders, and would prove to the Auditor that the Council or Committee had taken due precautions to avoid the acceptance of improper tenders. The requirement of this deposit would be included in the public notice prescribed by article 16 (2) of the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order 1899, as amended, and it should be clearly notified that the deposit will be forfeited to the Council or Committee unless both the intending contractor and his sureties duly attend at the proper time and place for the purpose of completing the bond according to the tender.

At the meeting of the Finance Committee, Mr. Ennis had moved the following resolution which had been seconded by the Chairman and adopted. - That for contracts under £10 a deposit of 10/- be required and for contracts over £10. a deposit of £1."

On the motion of Mr. Ahearne seconded by Mr. J. Bolger the recommendation of the Finance Committee was confirmed.

In connection with the same subject, the Local Government

Board, under date, 16th May, (letter No. 27.707, Wexford County) wrote- "That the Board considered that it is open to a county council to require the forms of Minute in such cases to be forwarded to them with the list of proposals, and to refuse to approve of a tender other than the lowest in any case in which the prescribed form has not been transmitted by the Rural District Council."

At the meeting of the Finance Committee, the following recommendation had been made on the part of Mr. Brown, seconded by Mr. Peacocke - "That the Clerks of the Rural District Councils of the County be directed to furnish special form of Minute prescribed by the Local Government Board, with their lists of proposals in all cases in which the lowest tender had not been accepted."

On the motion of Mr. Peacocke, seconded by Mr. Ennis the recommendation of the Finance Committee was approved.

The Assistant Secretary stated that he had furnished the Clerks of the Rural District Councils with a copy of the letter of the Local Government Board.

Fethard Pier.

under date 18th May, the following letter on the above subject was read from the Chairman of the Council, (Sir J. H. Grattan Esmonde)

Dear Mr. Fizzelle,

I have looked into the matter of Fethard Pier, as the Co. Council desired me to do, and I find that the Board of Agriculture would suggest an extension of the pier as shown by the dotted lines in the sketch below either from A. or B.



But the work would be very expensive." Mr. Cummins proposed, Mr. Shearne seconded, and it was passed. - 'That the Piers and Harbours' committee be requested to meet a local committee at the pier."

Payment of instalments of loans. Under date May 11th the following letter was read from the Board of Works. (No. 6700. 03)

"I am directed by the Commissioners of Public Works to refer to your letter of the 7th inst relative to the payment of instalments by the Wexford County Council, and in reply I am to state that Receivable Orders will be sent out to you in time for the May and November Meetings, and payments immediately after the first Tuesday in May, and November, respectively will be regarded as fulfilling the undertaking of punctuality."

Change of names of places.

Mr. W. H. Grattan-Flood, Enniscorthy wrote under date, June 8th as follows.

"I beg to bring under your notice a very desirable movement, namely the general desire of abolishing new fangled place-names, in favour of the old Irish names. Quite recently the County Council of King's County have not only discarded the name "Parsonstown" for the ancient designation of "Birr", but they have also restored the old Irish name of the village of "Kilcormac", which for 150 years was known as "Frankford". Might I request your Council to pass a resolution to restore the Irish name of "Buncloody" to the charming little town, which for the past 150 years has masqueraded under the nomenclature of "Newtownbarry", and also to abolish the name of the pretty village of "Bowtown" in favour of the Irish place

name "Kiltinnell" (Cill-t-Seachnall) which it was always known by till 1620 when an interloper called Fisher got it changed to "Fisher's Prospect." By restoring the two old place-names of "Bunclody and Kiltinnell" to their ancient forms you will contribute towards the preservation of Ireland's monuments, and help to perpetuate local topography."

Mr Peacocke said he would give notice of motion that the Council consider the matter at their next meeting, and that a clause be inserted in the next amendment to the Local Government (Ireland) Act 1898 to give county councils the power to change names to their old Irish designations if they so wish.

Fishery Laws.

On the motion of Mr. Brown, seconded by the Chairman, the following resolution received from the Antrim County Council was unanimously adopted.

Resolved - "That we ask the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction to oppose any clauses in the Fishery Bill now before Parliament, or in any Bills that may be brought forward which would be injurious to the industries of Ireland, depending as they are to such a large extent for their success and existence on water power, which would be most detrimentally affected by arbitrary and harassing restrictions contained in clauses 13, 15, 16, and 24, of the present Bill, and that copies of this resolution be sent to the several county councils of Ireland, and the members of Parliament for the county.

Claims by Deputy Surveyors. At the meeting of the Finance Committee, Mr. Elger, laid before the meeting applications from Mr. John Kehoe, and Mr. W. H. Jones,

Deputy Surveyors, for £10. and £6. 6s. respectively for attendance at court and work in connection with the recent prosecutions of the county council against the Southern and Western Railway Company.

The Finance Committee recommended - "that Messrs Kehoe, and Jones be paid locomotion expenses, according to the usual scale.

"On the motion of Mr. Hearn, seconded by the Chairman the recommendation of the Finance Committee was unanimously confirmed.

Application by Rate Collector.

The following letter under date, 30th April was read from collector John Barden.

"I expect a bonus of at least £4. for closing accounts of the late collector McGrath, and making inquiries first of who paid a part of arrears, and who said they paid in full, and of those who had acknowledgments for part. I had also to serve them with six days' notices and get them summoned and attend the petty sessions several days.

I had as much trouble to wind up as I would on my own collection. I had to pay over £5. out of my own pocket to close McGrath's, it was impossible to collect the arrears for the rate was very high on houses in McGrath's district for it includes six or seven villages. I had all the bad pays in McGrath's district to collect from, - had trouble with every one of them."

The following recommendation had been made on this letter by the Finance Committee -

"That the opinion of the Local Government Board be asked on the above letter as the Finance Committee would be inclined to recommend to the Council, that the

application of Mr. Barden be acceded to if they could do so legally".

Analyst's Report.

Copy of the report of Sir Charles Cameron, Analyst, for the quarter ended the 31st March 1903, was read for the meeting.

The Local Government Board, and the Department of Agriculture, it was stated had already been supplied with a copy.

Report of Sir Charles Cameron, B.Sc. U.D. Public Analyst, for the County of Wexford on Articles submitted to him for Analysis during the quarter ended 31st March 1903. 31 articles were received from the Food Inspectors R.I.C. as follows:-

They were all of good quality.

For the Guardians of Gorey Union fifteen drugs were analysed, two of them, namely, Tincture of Ferric Chloride, and Compound Tincture of Gentian, were low in iron and solids respectively.

For the Guardians of Enniscorthy Union thirteen drugs, seventeen specimens of tea, eight of port wine and two of milk were analysed.

One of the drugs, namely, Liniment of Aconite, was slightly low in solids.

One of the milks was under the average quality of pure milk. The specimens of tea and port wine were analysed to determine which were best for use in the Workhouse.

For Enniscorthy District Asylum five specimens of milk were analysed. Two were adulterated with at least 11 and 15 per cent of added water respectively.

For the Guardians of New Ross Union six drugs were analysed.

One of them, namely, compound Tincture of Gentian, was slightly low in solids.

Assistant Secretary's Holidays On the motion of W. Peacocke, seconded by W. J. Bolger, the recommendation of the Finance Committee, that the Assistant Secretary be granted three weeks' holidays was confirmed.

Solicitor's Costs.

The following resolution was adopted on the motion of W. J. F. Walsh, seconded by W. J. Bolger. That the costs of W. R. W. Elgee, our Solicitor, for this half year be referred to the proper Officer for taxation, and that a requisition to tax them be sealed, and that Mr. Tho. J. Healy, Solicitor, be appointed to represent the Council on the taxation.

Surplus - Sale of Dog Licenses.

Under date 25th May a letter from the Registrar of Petty Sessions Clerks' Office, stated that £422 : 18 : 7. had been paid over to the Treasurer of the County Council as surplus moneys arising from the sale of licenses under the "Dogs Regulation (Ireland) Act 1865.

Cheap Railway Tickets

The following letter under date 28th May was read from the Secretary of the Dublin Wicklow and Wexford Railway Co.

With further reference to your letter of the 7th instant, I am desired to inform you that an application for reduced fares for teachers and instructors, appointed by various counties in connection with the scheme for Technical Instruction, was considered at a meeting of the Managers of Companies parties to the Irish Railway Clearing House last October, and was declined. In view of this decision my Directors regret that they are unable to accede to the application of your County Council.

Notice of Motion - Kilmore Pier.

On the motion of Mr Brown, seconded by Mr Kehoe, ^{the} following resolution was adopted.

"That in order to facilitate the work of the contractor at the new breakwater at Kilmore Harbour, the contractor be granted the exclusive use of the slipway so far as he needs it during the summer months."

Poulduff Pier

Mr Kinsella moved (for Sir Tho^s H. F. Esmonde) the following notice of motion:-

"That we vote the sum of £1000. towards the construction of Poulduff Pier extension. That our Secretary be instructed to communicate with the Board of Works for the purpose of raising a loan to that amount - the charge in respect of which is to be a County at large charge."

Mr J. W. Doyle seconded the motion.

Lord Stopford proposed - That the question be

postponed till the November quarterly meeting of the Council, and in the meantime that the opinion of the Gorey Rural District Council on the proposed work be elicited."

Mr. Donohoe seconded.

Mr. Ennis moved. - "That subject to the approval by our Piers and Harbours Committee of the plans for new works at Koulduff Pier submitted to this Council, and our approval and confirmation of their report, we recommend the Proposal Committee to vote a sum of £1000 for the purpose of said works to be a bounty at Large charge on condition that the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction agree to contribute by free grant such further sum as may be necessary to complete said work."

Mr. Shearne seconded this amendment which on being put to the meeting was carried.

On the motion of Mr. Ennis, seconded by Mr. Cummins, the following resolution was adopted.

That the following committee be appointed to meet the Piers and Harbours Committee at Koulduff on Friday 26th inst at 12 o'clock noon.

Lord. Stopford, Messrs A. Kinsella, J. Bolger, J. Bolger, D. Kavanagh, M. Murphy, and J. W. Doyle, County Councillors, and Messrs Jas Lynch, Templecoby, Enniscorthy, James Doyle, Kilcasey Ferns, and W^m A. Ryan, Cahore representatives of the Enniscorthy and Gorey District Councils.

District Asylum Electric Light

On the motion of Mr. Ennis, seconded by Mr. Keacocke the following resolution was adopted.

That Messrs J. Bolger, J. B. Hearn, J. F. Walsh, and M. A. Ennis, be appointed a sub-committee, with power to approve of title

and draft conveyance in connection with the District Asylum Electric Lighting Scheme.

Assaly Bridge.

The County Surveyor stated that acting on directions received at last meeting of the Council, he had written to the contractors for the construction of the Waterford and Rosslare Railway Line as to the obstruction which had taken place at Assaly bridge on the morning of the last County Council meeting. He had received a letter in reply regretting that the obstruction had taken place and pointing out that it was quite unavoidable under the circumstances. In future when there was any likelihood of traffic being impeded in this way they would get Mr. Webster's authority".

The communication was regarded as satisfactory"
