No. K. - To clean out and repair a gullet across the road near the Westford Free Bridge, not to execut & 3: 10/- George Byrne, barcur, tendered for the full amount, but was not present, nor were his sweetils. The work was accordingly given in charge of the bounty Surveyor, on the motion of m. I. Bolger, seconded by m. Donohoe.

In connection with now. (weseford District) construction of a new road to Rosslare Harbour Rallway Station, the following resolution was read from wesefold District Council:

James Donohue, in lempleshannon, Ennicouthy; a sample of butter which on being submitted to analysis, was found to contain 1.3 per cent of water in excess of the mascinum proportion (is per cent) thereof allowable in a genuine sample of butter, under the Sale of Butter Greland) Regulations 1902. (Copy herewith). A copy of the report received from mr. Duignan in regard to this matter is enclosed, together with the certificate and copy thereof supplied by Sis b. a. bameron; who conducted the analysis in question. In this instance an offence would appear to have

bun committed against the provisions of Section 6 of the Sale of Food & Drugs Act, 1875; and the Department are therefore desirous that proceedings should, on behalf of your Local authority, be instituted in respect of the transaction within 28 days from the date on which the sample was obtained (vide Section 19 Sale of Food & Drugs Act 1899)"

"I am directed by the Local Government Board for breland, to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 25th instant, relative to a proposal of the bounty bouncil of westford to purchase from the waterford Steamship bo, an iron hulk for use in connection with the pier at Quincannon; and I am to state that, in the circumstances set forth, the Local Government Board will raise no objection to this proposal which they consider might be carried out under Section 18 (4) of the Local Government (Ireland) act, 1898."

transmit, hirewith, to be laid before the westford bo. bouncil, a copy of a letter in the matter, which the Board have received from the waterford Harbour bommissioners, and I am to state that the Board are unable to find that they have any authority to interfere in the matter"

The letter of the waterford Harbour Commissioners

was as follows:-

In reply to your letter Hggog of the 17th reltime I am directed by the waterford Harbour bommissioners to state as follows: - arthurstown is a small reliage situated on the eastern or bounty westford show of waterford Harbour. It is believed that the prinches by the Board of works, or by the bounty westford Irand Jury, and the structure of the Pier is now visited in the westford bounty bouncil. The adjoining water space however forms portion of waterford Harbour (see the waterford Harbour Order 1904 Section 12) and is consequently under the jurisdiction of my bommissioner.

The Pier dries out at low water and so far as is known has always done so, and the accommodation it affords is therefore only suitable for vessels of

small draft.

For the last eighteen months the westford bounty bouncil have been in correspondence with my bommissioners relative to having the place dridged fas also Duncannon another similarly evicumstanced place two miles farther down the Harbour) but as the receipts from the shipping using arthurstown & Duncannon only amounts to a few pounds a year, and as both places are already fairly suitable for the few vessels that resort them, my bommissioners do not consider that the cost of dridging would be justified by any corresponding benefit

The enclosed copies of letters from the weseford bounty bouncil and their Solicitor, m' Elgee, with my bommissioners replies thereto, will explain how the matter now stands. I also send you copy of a report by the Harbour master here."

under date 24th august 1907, the Board of Irade letter no. A. 10110) who to pointing out that the limits of the former boast-Guard Station at Kilmore for the purpose of attending to the burial of carcases washed ashore were:

East of Station- 5 miles 1480 yards.
West of Station - 3 miles 810 yards, and the Saltee Islands - 4 miles South.

The letter pointed out that arrangements should be made with the police to report barcases as they are washed ashow, and asking the date when newarrangement as to the burial of barcases by the representative of the bounty bounced would begin.

In connection with this matter the Finance Committee had recommended that a sum of 7/6 be paid mo o'Flaherty, Harbour master, Kilmore, for each carcase buried.

under date 20th October, Mr. O'Flaherty wrote that he was not prepared to carry out the work for this remuneration, as after paying a man of for burial he would perhaps have to walk ten miles for 2/6. He could not get across to the Salters under 10%.

If the bounty bouncil would allow him & 4, that was & less than he asked at first he would carry out the work.

With reference to a recommendation by the bourtour Harbour Committee, to grant the watchman an excitational allowance of £1 10% per annum in connection with lamps erected by directions of the Inspector of Factories. "It was decided on the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the allowance of £1:10% per annum be granted."

That this meeting of the Land and Labour association imbracing as it does so many Fishermen on the River Staney, begs to direct the attention of the bounty bouncil of istercford to the fact that much loss is caused to the fishermen in consequence of the present limited open session for fisher and we respectfully ask the bounty bouncil in the interest of the fishermen to have the present season is tended from the 17th march to 14th September, thus giving them a means of availing themselves of the full benefits of the fishing season on the river Staney"

Proposed by M? bummins, seconded by M? I Bolger and adopted; - "That the Fisheries Branch of the Department of agriculture & Ichnical Instruction be requested to hold an inquiry into the application of the Staney Fishermen to have the open season for salmon fishing on the river extended from 14th March to 17th September, as it seems to us equitable that the net fishermen should have the same privileges and facilities as those who fish with rod line"
