'we the undersigned representing the ratepayers and fishermen of Fethard, bo weseford, respectfully wish to draw your attention to the insufficiency of Harbour accomodation how.

1. There is not sufficient room in the dock for the number of boats at present

in Fethard.

There is no shelter for boats afloat, the dock being too small, and entirely dry at low water, so that in ease of bad weather there is no place of refuge. This is further accentuated when a load ship is unlading as then the entrance is so blocked up that no fishing boat can go either in or out.

2. It is almost impossible to charter a eargo vessel, as any drawing more than nine feet of water earnot dock even at highest tide, - therefore the freight averages from 1/= to 2/= a ton more than the freight of the same goods to waterford.

3. This dock is a constant source of expense to the bounty which derives no advantage

from it.

entirely new dock 140 feet wide running out until it obtained at least three feet of water at lowest tide would not only eliminate all the above disadvantages, but also would be of immense advantage for the neighbourhood and help to bring prosperity to the whole district.

If accomodation were afforded:

The local fishermen could have a more numerous fleet of boats of larger size which would enable them to fish the banks, off the local loasts, from which they are debarred by the inadequacy of their present small boats.

The know both from our own and from the experience of others that I thank is geographically better situated as head quarters of a fishing fleet than any other port on the boast-we may add that since last Spring a Scotch fleet of 45 boats have been fishing

off the Hook Tower, which proves the excellence of these fishing grounds.

5. Fethard would be a port of earl, for steam travelers engaged in fishing in this locality to land their fish in preference to milford.

4. It would be possible to import coal timber, manures, etc., from the district

at economical rates.

5. In export trade consisting of barley, oats, root crops, cattle, etc. would be

developed.

of these statements in view of the prospects of Railway facilities which shortly will be available. This is one of the most fertile districts in the bounty wereford which has hitherto enjoyed none of the advantages which other parts have had for years. we respectfully ask you to give us your assistance to obtain a dock that will be of practical use and we believe that only one of such a size as we have already mentioned will attain this end, but we are willing to consider whether any alternative proposal would be feasible.

Of the specimens of whiskey two were 26.5 and 41 degrees under proof and were therefore adulterated with at least 2 and 21.33 per cent of added water respectively.

Two of the specimens of buttermilk were adulterated with at least 21. and 21 per cent of added water respectively exclusive of 25 per cent allowed for churning purposes. The remaining articles were of good quality

For the Guardians of Gorey union twelve drugs were analysed, On of them, namely, Sincture of Ferric Chloride, was slightly low in vion.

Six drugs analysed for the Guardians of newRoss union were correct.
