## Quarterly meeting- 7th august 1906.

The Quarterly meeting of the bounty bouncil was held in the bouncil bhamber bourthouse, wiseford; on Tuesday 7th August 1906.

The Secretary, Mr R w Elger, Solicitor, and the bounty Surveyor were in attendance.

The minutes of the meetings of the bouncil, of 11th and 18th June, were read and confirmed.

m. Davitt and family wrote returning thanks to the bounty bouncil for the vote of bondolince passed in reference to the death of her husband m. michael Davitt.

- Superannuation of Assistant Surveyors. 
mr Ennis moved the following resolution of which he had given notice on 18th June:
"That a superannuation allowance of \$40 per annum be granted to mesers 1 & murphy and Patrick o'Ledry, Assistant Surveyors, under section 3-28 and 29 bic lap 26; and section 88 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, in accordance with the bounty bouncil's resolution of the 30th April, 906."

The following report from the County Surveyor under date it digust was read.

"I beg to report that on the 20th ult, the S. S. Mayflower of Cardigan collided with New Ross Bridge and damaged it messes R & D Jones 128 Brunswick Street Liverpool are the owners of the ship, Robert Roberts is master; and

michael whelan was the pilot The collission occurred at about 4 30 pm, the ship was coming down the river through the bridge against the rising tide about one hour blow high water, it first struck the pier on the new Ross side of the swing bridge and then struck the down stream dolphin.

I was wired for by the baretaker of the bridge, and I went over the next morning to inspect the damage. I found that the ornamental screen or moulding was smashed between the top of the cylinder and the capping over the main girder, and also a portion of the moulding under the top of the cylinder, also a panel of the hand rail near the centre of the swing bridge

has been injured.

I estimated that the cost of repairs would be about \$150. I at once put the matter into the hands of we Elgie, and, on the 27th ult. I had to again go to New Ross to point out the damage to a surveyor sent over by the bompany or their underwriters, the Surveyor said he thought I had overestimated the damage, but I still of opinion that my estimate was fair. I have gone into the figures as regards the cost and maintenance, and special repairs to Ferry carriag Bridge, and find that the total for the last ten years was 1900 8 10 which would give an average cost of about \$90 per year.

I have made inquiries re diedgers for the harbours of the waterford river. The Sicretary of the waterford Harbour Board has written to me that his Board have no Bucket diedger available at present, but that later on should any of their plant be disengaged he will write to me again. I have as yet received no reply from the Weseford Harbour Board, but I have

been informed that their bucket dredger is at

present engaged.

to me a few repairs necessary to slating, eaveshook and a downhipe in the fail, also a small beam under the gangway leading into the garden which is rotten and hanging down, should be removed. Hout & 3 would be required for the work.

I have written to arklow and waterford to inquire if any hulks are to be got in these harbours suitable for the work required at Ballyhack, I am informed that there are none. I have inserted an advertisement in the weaford Independent re same, but have so far received no reply. I am informed that an advertisement put in the Shipping Gazette and floyd's fist, 54 Gracichurch Street fordon, would elicit a good many replies.

"On the motion of the Chairman it was decided that the repairs at the gail be carried out, cost not to exceed £3."

"Regarding the question of hulks, it was decided on the motion of the Chairman, that the matter be left in the discretion of me welster, bounty Surveyor."

"On the motion of the Chairman it was decided that on the occasion of the next meeting of the Country Committee of Agriculture at New Ross, the members of the Country Committee who are also members of the Country Committee should see the Bridewell and report to the subsequent meeting of the Country Council."

The following was read from the Secretary"The furtion of the establishment of a system of veterinary dispensaries has engaged the attention of a large number of public bodies recently. It has been discussed by several bounty bouncils and bounty bommittees, and furnished an interesting dibate at a meeting of the Joish bouncils' General bouncil.

Several suggestions were made towards the drafting of a scheme by bounty bommittees, and at least one veterinary Surgeon drew up a series of proposals which he considered would meet the wishes of the profession.

The utility and necessity of striking out some plan under which poor farmers would be placed in a position to seewer veterinary advice is clearly admitted. Numbers of animals die annually, either through lack of advice or delay in seeking it, and, as our live stock is our most valuable national asset, the consequent loss must be enormous.

It is an absolutely wrong principle that doctors

and reterinary surgions must live by disease; instead of by its prevention, and, it agricultural industry of Ireland was organised as it should be, one would eschect that under a national insurance es-operative insurance scheme for live stock the attention of the reterinary surgions would be directed towards iradicating disease.

This desirable state of affairs is yet in the making, and until there is a brighter prospect of its fulfilment than appears at present, veterinarians must in a very large measure deal with disease pure and simple, and allow

hygiene, etc., to take eare of itself.

The veterinary dispensary system is apparently the simplest way to hand of attaining this object. And towards the solution of the dispensary veterinary system the Countywesford has taken a step in advance by the holding of a conference of veterinary surgions, and representatives of the County Council.

to ascertain if any scheme was feasible, because some prominent members of the veterinary profession are strongly opposed to

It was felt that through a round table conference the representatives of the bounty bouncil could discover how far the veterinary surgions were prepared to go to meet the bounty bouncil, and the veterinary surgeons might be able to outline a scheme to which they would not object

The meeting was held in the bounty bouncel bhamber, on 31st July.

on the part of the County Council there were present: mesors to H. Reacocke, M. A. Ennis, and the Secretary surgeons in attendance were: Mesors

games malone, Gorey; arthur Doblyn, waterford; w.g. Doyle, Enniscorthy; F. w. Laylor, New Ross, and J. A. Norris, of the Department of agriculture. m. Racocki was elected to the Chair. The following conclusions were arrived at: 1. That a dispensary veterinary system is necessary in the interests of the bounty generally, and is urgently needed for small farmers. 2 - That dispensaries be established in certain districts at which the v. S., will attend at stated hours for one day each week, and on which day chronic cases are to be treated. It is eschected that animals suffering from chronic affections well be brought to the dispensary! So far as possible the veterinary swigeon will, on dispensary days, arrange for attendance on other cases which cannot. be treated at the dispensary. Should his services be required outside dispensary days for any urgent cases he will be bound to attend them? 3. The following fees are to obtain for all eases treated at the Dispensary, or at the establishment of the reterinary Surgeon of the district: Farmers with a valuation up to \$20 to pay of6. Farmers from \$20 to \$40 5/2, medicines to be paid for in addition. Operations at the Dispensary- of for castration of houses, firing and other major operations. of 6 for minor operations, 1/2 per head for inocul ating calves against black leg. 4. The following fees were agreed to for visito at the homes of farmers to eases which cannot be dealt with at the dispensary of for first visit to animals the property of farmers whose valuat ion does not exceed \$15, and 1/6 in eases of farmers up to \$40, beyond this figure no one to be entitled to the benefits of the scheme, half above

fees to be paid for each subsequent visit, bredicines to be paid for by the farmer. Suggestions as follows were made regarding dispensaries: For Enniscorthy - W. Doyle's establishment at Enniscorthy, The Ballagh, and Ballindaggen. For Gorey: - mr malone's establishment in Gorey and Ballycanew. NewRoss: Ramsgrange and another lentre to be selected by mr Dobbyn. NewRoss: - "Mr. Daylor's establishment in NewRoss, also adamstown, provided it can be included in m. Laylor's district. with the opening of the new railway between Westford and waterford it would be a great benefit to Newkoss farmers if a redistribution of the districts of m. Daylor and m. Dobbyn could be effected. These gentlemen promised to consider the matter and to advise the bounty bouncel if they find themselves able to come to an agreement. At present the veterinary surgeons haveroughly \$ 70 per annum for disties which are confined to the Diseases of animals Acts. The following is the financing of theschemes which would probably be regarded asequitable and which there would be a reasonable probability the veterinary surgeons would accept: Five beterdnary Surgeons at \$ 180 per annum: To be contributed as follows -County Council 16875 Department 200 les Committee 75 £ 600.

At present the bounty bouncil are contributing \$328 towards veterinary salaries under the Diseases of animals acts.

The Department of agricultive are to be asked to sanction this scheme as an experiment for the province of heinster, and are recommended to have experiments on somewhat similar lines carried out in one bounty in each of the three other provinces, provided the bo bouncil, the bounty bommittee, and the

local veterinary surgions support it.
The scheme is to remain in operation for three years, and not to be continued after that heriod unless it receives the approval of all concerned in its working should experience at any time prove that details require alteration the necessary amendments can be made so long as they will not militate in anyway to the prejudice of the veterinary surgeons.

m. J. Bolger, the above scheme was approved."

The Chairman moved: That a copy of this scheme be sent to the Secretary of the Eneral Council, of the brish County Councils, with a request that the matter be brought up for discussion at next meeting. That our Secretary forward the scheme to the Department for approval."

Shat we believe the purchase of the Irish Railways by the County Councils of Ireland would be of immense service to Irish industries, and is a question of a pressing nature. And we request the General Council of County Councils to discuss the matter at their next meeting, with a view to instructing the people as to the danger to brish industries by the British Government, and also to consider the question of their purchase by the County Councils of Ireland. That copies of this resolution be sent to all the County Councils of Ireland, and to the General Council of County Councils and to the General Council of County Councils of Ireland.

-Southern Harbours & the Waterfood Harbour bomes under date 26 th July, the following letter no. 9496. was read from the assistant Secretary to the

Board of Inade.

"I am directed by the Board of Irade to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 14th instant, enclosing a copy of a resolution adopted by the westford bounty bouncil on the subject of the up-keep of the harbours of arthurstown, Duncannon, and Ballyhack, and the power of the waterford Harboler Commissioners with respect to these harbours. In reply I am to refer the bouncel to the Waterford Harbour act, 1846, which defines the powers of the Harbow Commissioners within certain specified limits, including the harbours in question. I am to add that the Board are not in a position to. eschress an authoritative opinion on the points raised in the bouncil's resolution.

The Chairman moved: That our Secretary send a copy of the letter of the Board of Irade to the Chilf Secretary for Ireland, and point out to him that it is impossible for the bounty Council to do anything with these harbours in the present indefinite state of the law; that it is not possible for the bounty bouncil to collect dues at these harbours, if the Waterford Harbour Commissioners are also to collect them, that in view of the doubt which escists whom the question that the bhief Secretany be requested to submit a case to the law officers of the brown to ascertain who has the control over these harbours. If it is found that the liability for keeping these harbours in repair resto with the westford to bouncil whether he will see his way to direct his attention to the desirability of promoting a marine works Bill neset Session for the South Eastern boast."

Mr. a. Keogh- Nolan, Secretary to the Erish Councils General Council, forwarded for adoption the following resolution:

"That this bouncil calls upon the Secretary of State for war to reconsider the change recently made in the army meat Gender Form, underwhich contractors can supply foreign meat killed at the Port of arrival, instead of native home bred meat which the late Government some years ago gave an undertaking to encourage we further call upon the Government to invite, in future, tenders to supply native agricultural produce, such as Dato, Aay, and Stlaw for troop horses, and as far as possible to give Irish Contractors a chance in the competition for the equipment of troops and horses stationed in this Country."

If not, the Department will, immediately before the next meeting of the Finance Committee, (which it is understood will take place early in Movember next) submit an estimate of the amount of work thin accomplished when provision should be made for paying to the Department a proportional amount of the Country contribution."

Proposed by mo Peacocke, seconded by mo Kehoe, and passed "That the attention of the pepart-ment of agriculture be drawn to the cement used for improvements at Poulduff Pier being of foreign manufacture and we request that in future the cement to be used should be of brish manufacture, cement of a first class quality being manufactured in bounty weseford."

under date 20th July, the Department of Agriculture
(letter 10. 8888) wrote as follows:

"The Department of Agriculture and Jechnical

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Instruction desire to forward for the information of your Local authority, the accompanying copy of a Poster which the Department have had prepared with the view of drawing the attention of the public, interested in the exportation of sheep to the scope of certain regulations in the above mentioned Orders of the Board of agriculture and Fisheries of Great Britain. under these regulations it will be observed that during certain specified periods of the year, no sheep, whether British or Irish burned, will be allowed to be exposed for sale in a market, fair or saleyard, within any of the three areas to which the Orders (Shelp Dipping Scotland Orders of 1906, Sheep Dipping North of England Orders of 1906, Sheep Dipping wales Order of 1906) apply, unless the animals are accompanied by a diclaration in the Form prescribed in the Schedule to the Order relating to that area. As the Poeter indicates persons in Ireland who may desire to make diclarations in accordance with these regul ations will be in a position to obtain forms for the purpose by applying at any Police Barrack. ' The Department are alranging to have the Poster eschibited at Police Stations, and I have to suggest that it would be advan tageous if, in addition, your Local authority took steps to have it displayed otherwise throughout their district." Ordered: That the orders in question be advertised. and posted throughout the bounty."

J. in the Freeman of the 6th inst., to express an opinion in connection with the Trinity bollege university proposals now before the public, hereby record our opinion that apart from the Educational mirits, the proposal could not be safely intertained unless batholics had full representation on the governing body, and even then we doubt if the scheme on its working would ensure the harmony necessary to success; and we therefore recommend in preference the proposals outlined by the Robertson Commission, and trust the Government well at last do justice to batholics by formulating a scheme of university Eddication that will be as satisfactory to them as Trinity bollege is to Protestants!" The resolution was seconded by m. Ennis, and passed.

under date 28th June, 1906 the following letter was read from Sit I. H. Esmonde Bart. In P.—
"With reference to the resolution you have sent me from the bounty bouncil regarding the extension of the financial advantages of the new labourers acts to those unions which have made a generous use of the previous Acts, I write to state that the question is engaging the serious attention of the Irish Party.
