On the motion of Mr Browne seconded by Mr Peacocke McEdmond Hore was re-elected vice-chairman, and signed the usual declaration of office Both gentlemen returned thanks for their re-election

on the motion of the chairman the following portion of a statement made by him in returning thanks for his re-election was ordered to be inserted on the minutes for the purpose of reference at future annual meetings

For the purpose of comparison the Standard Year" furnishes the best outerion. any figures taken from '98 would be entirely illusory because during the period covered by it, the Local Gov! Ireland Bill was before the House of Commons, and in preparation for its inception, Boards of Guardians, and Guand juries, all over the Country were engaged in "winding up their affairs" for the new measure.

As the Standard year is based on average actual expenditure the figures when from it are the best data we can procure in contrasting then expenditure under the new act with what obtained under the old regime. For this reason I have taken the figures of the standard year, and in dealing with the various items. I have endeavoured as far as possible to avoid elaborate detail which would only tend to confuse the "man in the street" and would be intellegible only to those possessing an intimate knowledge of County decounts.

You will of course see from this, that the Aquicaltural Grant is treated as if it had been <u>raised</u> by the Rate and if this had been done the amount we would have levied over the amount in the Standard year would be £ 6719.

In considering this increase we find that the most serious item of increased eschenditure is in the bounty Charges but before dealing with this it may be as well to refer to the increases or decreases in the other instance. In the Union bharges account several items which were heretofore paid by the Guardians now fall on the liverty this is an important point in this connection. These items include payment of fees under the Jurors and Registeration of toters acts betweenary mose for Galaries, and contingent sevences under bontagious Diseases Animals Acts Bundage to Poor Rate Collectors, preparation of rate Books 40.

Again; portion of the Business of the Boards of Guardians has been transferred to the District bouncils and it is more than protable that the District bharges which in the past dealt practically with baronial roads, a few insignificant items for malicious supery compensation, have been increased to the figure shown (\$1584) by this transfer. This amount, or the greater portion of it, should be put against the decrease in the Union Charges as it was incurred in administeration formerly within the purview of the Boards of Guardians alone. All this would lead to the belief that the actual cost of the maintenance of workhouses would if anything show an increase for the past year.

As regards Union expenditure the bounty bouncil do not escurcise the same control as over District Council Expenditure The latter is considered by the bouncel at each quarter and it is within the competence of the bounty bouncel to approve, modify, or refect it. The Union escpenditure is taken without alteration from the blerks estimates and the utmost the bouncel can do is to call attention to particular items for elucidation, a matter which is scarcely likely to drive, as

the estimates of the Clerks have to be approved by the Local Government Board.

District Council expenditure must of necessity show a slight increase if in no other way than by the new mode of administration, the salaries voled for clerks to, as hereto fore, the road Sessions and Grand jury business was managed from the office of the Secretary of the Grand yary The decrease in the Wirban Charges is not likely to a recurrence in most years account because the amounts estimated in first demands fell short of the expenditure to which urban Districts are liable to contribute. The question of the large increased in the County Charges is therefore the most important on for the boundy council to consider inasmuch as the expenditure under this

head lies alsolutely within their control in so far as the Local Governmen't Board do not interfere. It would be well for a moment to escamine the particular items of this increase

It is unnecessary to dwell upon the preliminary expenses which must attend the introduction of such a great measure as the Local Government act.

Were obliged in this connection to grant £7672. compensation to Baronial Constables and their deputies as a solation for depriving them of their fees. Half of this waspaid by the Government,

though it is a mistake to think, as some do that it came as a gift from the English Freasury. It was taken from an Irish fund the Local Dascation Account, the proceeds of which are dis-- tuluted to the Councils annualy.

Besides another portion of it is made up of a sum payable by road contractors who are thus saved what was a direct tase upon them and indirectly a rate on the public.

The expenses paid for bringing the act into operation in be Wescford are the lowest in Seland and a similar observation applies to the cost of permanant staff and preparation of rates books, these are two important facts of which I trust the public will take note.

It is expected that after a little more experience of the working of the act the clinical work in connection with the Rate books will be qually lessened. Where it not for

The Board descre to point out that an opportunity was given to the bounty bouncil of the solarity was given to the bounty bouncil the solarity of stating their views with regard to the salaries of their officers

"The bounty bouncil of these ford came to no agen-"ment with their officers in the matter and the Local "Sovernment Board had therefore no courses offer open to them but fisc the salaries as they were "required to do by section 115 (18) of the Local Govern-"ment Treland act 1898"

The following letter was received from We Webster bounty Surveyor "as my salary has been fixed at & soo per annum from the first of April 1899, I beg to remind you that the arrears of salary due to me to the 1st april last amounts to & 200. Also the balance due of the £ 100 for bringing the Act of 1898 into operation amounts to £ 70. The total amount due to the first April last is therefore £ 275. Ibould you be good enough to order

this amount to be paid to me" Applications of a similar nature were read from Messis jones, Muchy reary assistant Surveyors. The Chairman said that many Members of The Council might remember that a deputation was appointed from the General Council of the trisk bounty Councils it wait on the Chief Secretary with regard to this question, and the qualification of assistant Surveyors. He had received a letter from me Sweetman the Georetary to the Irish bounty bouncils General Council enclosing a boby of a letter which he had received from the Secretary to the Chief Secretary, pointing out that in view of the full discussion which had taken place in the souse of Commons. on these subjects, the Chief Secretary did not think that any object could be gained by receiving the proposed deputation.

In the motion of the chairman seconded by Weacocke the following recommendation of the Finance Committee was unanimously approved -That we decline to comply with the demands of the focal Government Board for increased remuner ation in the cases of our County Surveyor, and assistant Surveyors, no reason having been advanced by the focal Government Board for increasing the salaries of these officers

I hat the notice of the transaction received by this bouncil from the Local Government Board was quite insufficient, the only intimation of this proceeding being the receipt of a printed circulat, which was sont to the Secretary of the bounty Council enstead of being sent, as it should have been, to the chairman and every member of the bouncil, and in the extreme pressure of business connected with putting the act into operation, and the effort made by this bouncil to deal with the deluge of circulars which poured in upon them last year, the wegency of this matter escaped our notice.

"That as a simple matter of equity and ordinary courtesy the bouncil had a right to expect that a question of such importance, should not have been decided by the

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entatives of the ratepayors. This consideration has been admitted to weigh with the Local Government Board in their subsequent correspondence with this council, in which they are pleased to intimate that if they had known what the true state of the case was when they delivered their judgement, that judgement would have been different from what it was.

That we protest against the monstrous increase in the salary of our County Surveyor by for a year as we consider his previous salary was fisced at a figure, which was if anything too high The case of the deputies is stell more unreasonable as it is proposed by the Local Government Board that their remumeration should be increased 87 per cent while their duties are decreased by 20 per Cent

That this Council is quite prepared to pay proper remuneration to its bouchty surveyor, and deputy surveyors for any real increase of work in connection with the Local Government act, but, for the many reasons abready given in correspondence with the Local Government Board, and into which we do not now propose to go and inasmuch as there is a question of principal involved we are resolved in the interests of the rate payers to take "whatever steps may be necessary to protect their rights "in this matter"

"The Chairman said that he would ask Me Sweetman to communicate with the bounty bouncils of Dublin, Fermanagh, and shevry, who were in a someuthat similar position with themselves in this matter and endeavour to ascertain if these bouncils, would take combined action with Weseford in any steps that might be considered advisable or necessary in this contest with the Local Government Board.

Letter No. 28, 915, 1900 (Wesclord County) from the Local Sovernment Board, stating that they had given instructions for the issue of their consent to a superannuation allowance of \$40. a year to W Ryan, late Assistant bounty Surveyor was read.

The Secretary said that he had since received the sealed order of the Local Government Board with reference to this matter.
