Kavanagh Registrar of the bounty Infirmary, ideocford: In accordance with directions received from my Board, I beg to state that at the meeting of the bommittee of management, held 11th September, 1911, Lady Doran's notice of motion That an extra nurse or wardsmard be appointed in consideration of the increased number of patients in the house, was considered, and, after a discussion, it was proposed by mr. Elgir, and seconded by archdiacon Latham, and passed unanimously: That Cady Doran's notice of motion be deferred to a later date, and that a request be laid before the bor bouncil to increase the grant from \$1000 to \$1200, and that Registrar place particulars and information before the bounty bouncil.

It was stated by hady Doran that she had heard several complaints about the attendance on patients in the Institution not through neglect of the nurses or wardemaids but through the strain of a large number of patients on a small staff. The escense of appointing a nurse would be for for salary, rations; etc., when members concurred with Lady Doran, or Furlong, the Resident Surgeon, esceptained to the Board that he was very anserious to have another nurse appointed. He did not approve of a wardemaid being appointed. W. R. W. Elger

The acts relating to the matter are: The boroners (Ireland) act 1846" the boroners act 1892" and "The boroners (Ireland) act 1908, and it is under the provisions of these two latter acts that the

Deputy boroner is appointed.

By Section 22 of the act of 1846 provision is made for the holding of Inquests, if the boroner deem such necessary, and for the issue by the boroner of his Precept to the bonstabulary to summon a jury and witnesses to attend

such Inquest.

By Section 1, Sub-section 1 of the act of 1892 the boroner is empowered to appoint a fit person, approved of by the bo. Council, to be his deputy, and by Sub-section 3 of the same section such Deputy may act for the boroner during his absence for any lawful or reasonable cause, or at any Inquest which the boroner is disqualified for holding, but not otherwise.

By Sub Section 5 of said Section, it is provided: "That for the purpose of an Inquest or act which a Deputy of a boroner is authorised to hold or so he shall be deemed to be that boroner and have the same jurisdiction and powers and besubject to the same obligations, liabilities and disqualifications as that boroner."

Having regard therefore to the terms of this latter Sub-section, I am clearly of opinion, that the Deputy boroner has, in the

absence of the boroner, full power, should he dum an Inquest requisite, to issue the Precipt for the holding of such Inquest and for the summoning of a jury and witnesses without any specific directions from the boroner. The act of 1892 formerly applied only to England but the act of 1908 made it applicable to Ireland also."
